SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—Lefty O'Doul went into a slump last week and the Pacific Coast league is without a batter who is hitting over the .400 mark. The Salt Lake outfielder dropped eleven points and is now tied with Paul Waner for top place with an average of .396, unofficial figures show.

Frank Brazil of the Seattle Indians is next with a .370 average and Rohwer of Portland, batting .351 trails Brazil.

"Hack" Miller of the Oaks, is setting the pace for his club with .347 and Hood tops the Angels with .340. An average of .351, gives M. Shea the honors on the Sacramento team with Griffin with .307 leads the Tigers.

Tony Lazerre, Bee shortstop, is in a class by himself for home runs with a total of 44. Rohwer is his

closest competitor with 33. Hummel of Portland, leads in the stolen base department with 28 and Lazerre is a close second with 27.

Mrs. Hauxwell and her husband were enroute home after visiting in Seattle. Mrs. Hauxwell attempted to change from the back to the front seat, while the car was in motion, but lost her balance, falling out of the car and striking on her head and becoming unconscious. She did not regain full consciousness for about a half hour, and suffered a bad cut on the left temple, as well as a sprain of the left ankle. Her body was badly bruised and she received several scratches about the forearms. She was taken back to Creswell, where she was given first aid, and came on to Roseburg this morning to receive further examinations of injuries.

FILIPINOS HOPE FOR FINAL STEP IN INDEPENDENCE

(Associated Press Local Wire.) **VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 14.**—The third Philippine Independence commission enroute to Washington arrived here today on the liner President McKinley of the American-Oriental mail line.

"I wish to express once more the faith of the Philippine people in the spirit of justice and fair-mindedness of the great republic we are approaching," said Sergio Osmeña, president protempore of the senate of the Philippine Islands and 15 years speaker of the lower house, head of the commission.

"It is for this reason we are not greatly concerned about the systematic and continuous propaganda against the Philippines and their aspirations.

"A misleading presentation of the facts may cause a temporary impression," declared the head of the commission, "It cannot achieve permanent results—much less lead the American people to break the policy of emancipation that has been so clearly and so definitely laid down by their representatives in congress.

"What is needed is a final settlement for the interest of both peoples."

The delegation goes direct to Washington on arrival of the McKinley at Seattle today.
