FARM NEWS

The powdery mildew disease of red clover, thought to have invaded the United States about 1922 from Europe, has again appeared this year in Oregon. Reporting comes to the station at Corvallis will help in applying effective control measures.

The fungus consists of a powdery white coating on the leaves. Where abundant it will stunt the growth of the plants. As far as can be learned, injurious results do not follow the feeding of affected clover to stock of any kind. The unusually dry season may have been especially favorable and the disease may not become serious in Oregon, think the station specialists.

If it does, either the clover producers will have to use a resistant type of clover or resort to applications of sulfur which are in general the best means of controlling diseases of this character. The disease has made rapid headway in many eastern clover growing sections of the United States and is creating considerable concern.

Fall is the best season to sort out and dispose of breeding ewes that fall below standard, says H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist for the state college extension service. It will pay the owner to keep in mind a definite standard of type in building up a profitable flock, he believes. Disposing of those ewes showing the worst faults and mating the others to a good ram for several years will rapidly improve the flock without displacing too many ewes each year.

In culling out condemned ewes conformation is an important consideration because two-thirds the yearly return from a ewe is from the lamb she produces. Blackness, level, rump, a well-filled leg of mutton, and well sprung ribs associated with a wide muzzle are outstanding points to be looked for in a desirable conformation. Broken mouths and spoiled udders are sufficient to justify getting rid of a breeding ewe. Her ability to produce a good lamb should also be considered.

Artificial support for branches overloaded with fruit becomes pressing just before the crop colors up, with the starches largely turning to sugar as the fruit matures. Most Oregon trees that have been rightly pruned from the start, get along all right without tying or bracing, as it is considered by growers and experiment station specialists a good practice now to allow the upright limbs to bend down with their fruit and thus spread the true, mast of 2-inch square poles, one and on the ground, a few feet higher than the tree with ropes tied to the branches needing support, are used and recommended by the experiment station, though rather expensive in some districts.

In hill selecting next year's potato seed hills that show growth and look vigorous later than the average are recommended by the experiment station for improvement in the Oregon potato crop. The leaves should be normal for the variety with no unusual wrinkling or mottling—indications of mosaic. Mosaic leaves have small areas less green and more yellow than the healthy leaf. Sometimes these leaves appear to have thin spots in them. Plants with uniform, green smooth leaves are the best. They may be staked now and dug later or dug now and put into crates for storage on cooling out. Seed selection pays in the commercial field and is particularly valuable for next year's seed plot.

KILLS EX-WIFE, TAKES OWN LIFE IN FRISCO PARK

Jealous Man Fires on Former Wife and Escort Before Big Crowd.

BODY FOUND TODAY

Disappeared Into Woods Following Tragedy Yesterday—Body Found in Bushes.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 14.—The body of John Govaer, mechanic, who shot and killed his divorced wife and severely wounded her escort in Golden Gate Park yesterday, was found today with a bullet hole in the head in a clump of bushes near the scene of yesterday's tragedy.

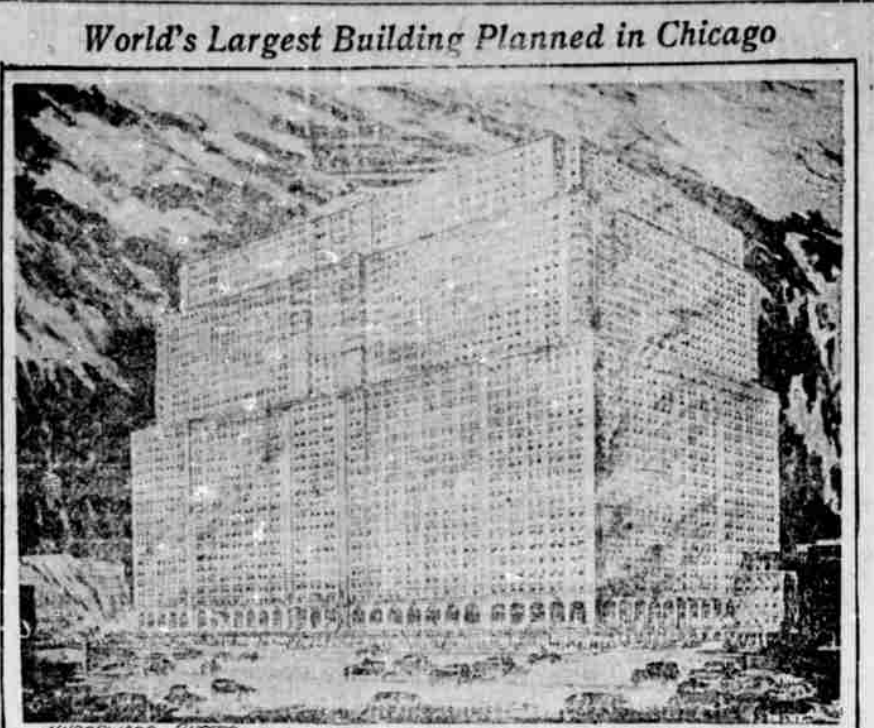
The police suppose that Govaer returned to the murder scene to kill himself.

Scores of Sunday picnickers and strollers witnessed the shooting yesterday. Hundreds more were in the park and they were thrown into alarm as shotgun squads of police, in motor cars, on horseback and afoot, began exploring the countless by-ways and trails through the labyrinth of brush that makes portions of the park a picturesque wilderness.

As the man and the woman alighted from a street car at an entrance to the park near the ocean, about noon, Govaer followed. When the couple entered the park, he opened fire. They both fell, and Govaer disappeared into a wooded stretch of the park.

Police gathered this account from numerous witnesses and from Jacobs. The woman was dead when passers-by reached her. Jacobs was taken to a hospital. He may recover. He told the police that Govaer had threatened his ex-wife several times and seemed crazed with jealousy. She was 33 years old and after the divorce had resumed her maiden name of Hazel Young.

The riot squads combed the park cautiously, fearing that Govaer would resist arrest with his revolver.

G. O. P. NATIONAL COMMITTEE WILL NOT SUPPORT BOB, JUNIOR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Support of the republican national committee will be withheld from Robert M. La Follette, Jr., in the special state election in Wisconsin if he is nominated in the republican primary tomorrow.

This declaration was made today by Chairman Butler of the national committee. Whether some other republican candidate will be supported by the national organization, he said, is a matter for the republican senatorial campaign committee to decide.

Roy Wilcox of Eau Claire, who is opposing Mr. La Follette as a "coolidge republican" candidate already has given notice that, in event of his defeat in the primary, he would run in the general election.

Chairman Butler said that, while Mr. La Follette had availed himself of the regular republican machinery in seeking the senatorial nomination to succeed his father, he could not be regarded as a republican, in view of his position as chief lieutenant to his father in the campaign the latter conducted last fall in a platform opposed to that adopted by the republican convention at Cleveland.
