## NOISY JAZZ REPLACES OLD NATIVE MELODIES OF HAWAIIAN ISLANDS

HONOLULU, Sep. 14.—Hawaiian troubadours, the wandering musicians who once filled the island nights with the melodies of the olden days with voice and stringed instruments, have traded their ukuleles and banjos for saxophones and are making "the night hideous with their wails."

This is the statement of Charles E. King, former territorial senator and composer of many Hawaiian songs, who is taking an active part in a movement to revive the ancient custom of serenading by night with ukuleles and other stringed instruments.

"People want to hear the old songs," Senator King said.

"They want to dance, too, and can dance to anything that has rhythm. But there is nothing in the world which makes lovelier dance music than the songs of the islands, which provide a wide variety of time and rhythm so that any sort of modern dance music can be achieved. The tendency now, simply because people do not discourage it, is to play noise. The dance orchestras today, using largely the saxophone, do not produce melody. Sometimes the men who play the saxophones do not know either their instruments or music. But they are natural musicians and so pick out their own way of playing, with the result that an orchestra sometimes is led

# PENDLETON ALL RIGGED OUT FOR ROUND-UP WEEK

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 14.—With her streets bedecked in flags, electric light strings and bunting and her populace to a man rigged out in rainbow shirts, Pendleton is ready for the Sixteenth Annual Round-Up, which opens September 16th and continues to the 19th. Pendleton homes are open to the anticipated thousands of visitors, and the twin spirits of true western hospitality and high carnival reign supreme.

But it is at Round-Up Park where complete preparations have been made for a Round-Up that will overshadow all of Pendleton's previous cowboy congresses. Here are buckers groomed to the very pink of condition, like the skilled fighters they are. Day after day for the past fortnight the top buckers of Pendleton's string have been ridden in trouts, to get their muscles supple, and their spirits high for the coming contests.

And they look like race horses, with silky hanks throwing back highlights of sunlight, and eyes throwing out glints of a wicked fire.

New corrals have been built to handle a bigger number of steers for roping and bulldozing events, and from the four corners of the United States, cowboys have begun to gather for the supreme contests of cowboydom, to finish the fight for the coveted title of world champion all-around cowboy, and the famous Roosevelt Trophy given by the Roosevelt hotel of New York, to its winner. Paddy Ryan, present holder of this crown, will be here to defend his honors, and there will be a field of several score of challengers all eager and anxious to lift them.

Outstanding among these contenders is Mike Hastings, shown above. Hastings, as far as Round-Up officials can predict now, will be the only cowboy to enter all four of the Roosevelt Trophy events, which include bulldozing, roping, broncho busting, and the wild horse race. Mike will seek trophy honors from all these angles, and since Ryan rides bronchos and bulldozes only, the 1925 contest ropes and bulldozes only, it is regarded as likely that Hastings may win.

## PART OF ZUIDER ZEE MAY BE RECLAIMED BY NETHERLANDS

AMSTERDAM, Sep. 14.—Holland has under consideration a project for draining part of the Zuider Zee, the only available way in which the country can add more territory for its increasing population. Within the last 200 years the country's area has been extended by reclamation projects from 8,000 to 12,900 square miles.

Zuider Zee has an area of approximately 900,000 acres, and while it is not intended to reclaim all of this, it is said that about 500,000 acres could be drained and thus add that much of very fertile land to the country's area.

The damming of Zuider Zee, quite apart from its drainage, would result in great benefit to the adjacent provinces, as the frequently occurring floods which cause enormous damage, would be a thing of the past. The estimated value of the land that would be reclaimed is \$204,000,000.

## SOUTHERN OREGON CITIES TO JOIN IN PUBLICITY EFFORT

ASHLAND, Ore., Sept. 12.—Southern Oregon will start a community advertising campaign in the newspapers of Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and other leading Pacific coast cities if plans tentatively discussed this week by local chamber of commerce officials mature.

The California-Oregon Power company is initiating the advertising movement and has received an advertising campaign outline from the H. K. McCann Advertising agency of San Francisco, which handles the community advertising for the Californians, Inc., the All-Year club of Southern California, Phoenix, Arizona, and many other cooperative advertising campaigns.

The plan calls for the insertion of 25 advertisements in the newspapers, the cost of which is to be borne by the commercial organizations of Ashland, Klamath Falls, Medford, Grants Pass and Roseburg as well as various other organizations.

The agency recommended that southern Oregon should not at first enter the eastern advertising field in competition with the strongest and best financed communities, but should spend its entire funds in the Pacific coast territory, where thousands of tourists and prospective settlers are attracted each year. At a future meeting of delegates from the various communities of southern Oregon definite plans and organization will be discussed.

## COOK WITH GRAS.

DONORS SHOULD NOT DICTATE CHURCH PLANS, SAYS REPORT

NEW YORK, Sep. 14.—The tendency to sacrifice dignity and beauty to the whims of wealthy contributors of funds for building churches is decried in a report by a joint commission on church architecture to be submitted to the General Convention of the Episcopal church to be held at New Orleans, beginning October 7.

"Paying for a new church, an altar, a window or a rood screen," says the report, "doesn't give the donor a right to impose his own taste on posterity or justify the rector, wardens and vestrymen in accepting something that is bad. Nepotism in church architecture is as bad as nepotism in church preferment."

The report recommends that students in the theological seminaries be given brief courses each year in architecture and the art of the church. It also recommends a paying tribute to American architects and artisans, the report says:

"There are many architects in America who have proved they can build a church right. There are several makers of stained glass as able as those in England. There are absolutely competent wood carvers, cabinet makers, metal workers, needle women and embroiderers. Go to them direct. Never send for a catalogue."

## ALBINO BABY ALARMS SAVAGE TRIBE IN WHICH IT WAS BORN

SEATTLE, Sept. 14.—(A. P.)—Curtis King, a Memphis manufacturer, in Seattle this summer, returning from the Far East, told of an albino child that had been born to parents of the Moie race, a savage tribe wearing brass rings on ankles and wrists and whose ears are pierced with strange ornaments. King said he travelled hundreds of miles out of his way to the settlement of Djiring, French Indo-China, to take pictures of the youngster.

The baby was born the parents and the rest of the jungle community were so amazed that they feared some evil was descending upon them, King related. The child is now four years old.
