WORK ABSOLVED FOR NEGLECT OF PROJECT RELIEF

President Says Interior Secretary Merely Carrying Out the Law.

CONGRESS AT FAULT

Criticism of Cabinet Member Over Reclamation Work in the West Undeserved.

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15. — Congress and not the interior department is to blame in the opinion of President Coolidge, because relief has not been afforded settlers on some reclamation projects in the west.

Secretary Work, whose administration has been attacked in some quarters, is held by the president to be merely carrying out the law as he sees it.

Thus far, it was said today at the White House, no protest aimed at the interior secretary has been received by the president. The latter holds that if congress at its last session had passed a bill favored by the administration for relief of settlers so that there would be no ground for complaint.

The government's reclamation project is clearly defined by law, in President Coolidge's view, and while there is no desire upon the part of the administration to change this policy as a general proposition, it has been the government's contention that relief should be afforded to some localities.

The administration's plan is for work in the west to go on as needed, but an effort will be made to determine before new work is initiated on a large scale whether it will be a paying proposition, and whether settlers can be secured.

During the last few years, as President Coolidge sees it, there has been a noticeable decrease in the demand for irrigated land, due in large measure to low prices for farm products, but he expects that as conditions improve there will be a sufficient number of settlers in prospect for the government to speed up its reclamation work.

Published reports from Boise, Idaho, recently have said that a number of western senators dissatisfied with reclamation policies, would urge the president to remove Secretary Work. Senator Borah, republican of Idaho, has an engagement with the president at which the general policy of the interior department is supposed to provide a schedule for discussion, but the senator has declined to discuss the reports.

AMUNDSEN TO MAKE POLAR ATTEMPT IN PLANE NEXT SPRING

LONDON, Sept. 15. — A dispatch to the Westminster Gazette from Oslo, Norway, says the next expedition of Roald Amundsen toward the North Pole, which will be undertaken in an airship, is to start in Italy, will start from Rome next spring. The route of the flight will be via Pahlam, Froudhjem, Norway, and King's Bay, Spitzbergen.

cheese, each operating independently but a movement has now been launched to bring them into one large marketing organization.

In another district he found 200 factories manufacturing American cheese, all under one organization. The factories are centered around 10 branch assembling warehouses, and each of the 2 groups has a representative in the central selling group. This great organization markets its products all over the United States and in 1924 shipped 25 cars into Los Angeles.

His next stop was at Philadelphia where he attended the Cooperative Institute for research. Machine experts from all sections of the country attended and exchanged ideas and experiences.

"At these meetings it was emphasized," said Kipp, "that each community must be considered separately; also that conditions surrounding a community should be considered, separately, as no two organizations can be operated the same."

From Philadelphia he went to New York where he conferred with the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers and the cranberry people; thence he went to Washington where he conferred with William Harper Dean, manager of the Agricultural department at the United States chamber, who recently conducted the national agricultural conference in Portland, and with E. G. Montgomery, head of the food products division of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce.

In Florida he gave five days to a study of producing and marketing conditions among the celery, potato and citrus fruit growers, and from there returned home by way of Los Angeles.

NEW EXTENSION OF SOUTHERN PACIFIC WILL CUT DISTANCE

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 15.—President William Spruille, of the Southern Pacific company, announced today that the through line from Klamath Falls to the east will run through Tule Lake, on the borderline of Siskiyou and Modoc counties in California, to a connection with the Nevada-California railroad, which will be standard gauge. The new line will connect with the Central Pacific main line in Nevada.

"This route has been chosen because it affords the shortest main line service from Southern Oregon and Northern California to the east via Ogden, with a low grade line," Mr. Spruille said. "It will cut the present distance from Klamath Falls via Ogden to all eastern points substantially in excess of 200 miles. It will be substantially 200 miles shorter to St. Louis, Chicago, Omaha, or Kansas City than the proposed northern line route, via Bend, Oregon.

"There is not enough traffic, existing or potential, to support the proposed extension of the northern lines from Bend to Klamath Falls, in addition to our own comprehensive plans and this fact is of first consequence to us.

"Those plans as announced, look toward the support of revenue derived from hauling the traffic of the mills either established or to be built upon our lines or on the lines of the California, Oregon and Eastern railroad and by such mills as may be established on the Nevada-California-Oregon railway by extensions into the basins tributary on the one hand to Klamath Falls and on the other to Lakeview as the demand for logs and lumber makes reasonable.

"Our traffic resources rest not only upon the industries on our lines, but upon the raw materials that will feed and maintain such industries.

"It is therefore proper to add that if the northern lines are granted permission to come into Klamath Falls to share the traffic, in that section and the territory intermediate enroute, then we cannot undertake to go ahead with our plans as outlined.


