BRITAIN TO SET NO TERMS FOR THE FRENCH-U. S. DEBT

(Associated Press Local Wire.) WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—France's war debt to the United States must be settled without any reference whatever to the terms of agreement that nation may have reached with Great Britain.

The Utah senator's point of view, made public in a statement, was made known co-incidentally by a visit to the White House by Senator Borah, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, who protested against more lenient terms to France than were given to Great Britain by the United States.

Senator Smoot issued his statement on arriving here to attend the meeting of the French and American funding bodies, while Senator Borah took the occasion of his first meeting of several months with President Coolidge to voice his views, with the added remark that he would have something to say about the situation when congress re-convenes.

"The United States," Senator Smoot said, "will settle with France without any reference whatever to the conference held between M. Gaillaux, French finance minister and Mr. Churchill, the British chancellor of the exchequer, or any propaganda by either one of them. The United States has nothing to say about any political deals or understandings between European countries and does not propose to be drawn into them."

"M. Caillaux, and associates, will be granted every possible chance of presenting their sides of the question. The United States commission will look after the interests of America."

It was pointed out that by the agreement reached between Caillaux and Churchill at London, France is to pay Great Britain an interest rate of 2 per cent on its war debts to that country.

Senator Smoot declined to amplify his statement or to discuss possible terms which may be presented to the French commission, but administration officials have made it clear that France may not expect a preferential treatment which was given to Belgium and the recent agreement with that country respecting the settlement of its war debts.

It is the present view of administration officials and many leaders of congress, that France should settle on a basis similar to that by which Great Britain funded its huge war debt to this country.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—World's series preparations in Pittsburgh, went steadily forward today, in spite of the slicing of the Pirates' advantage to six games over the Giants and the menace of other eastern teams, now making their last swing through the west.

McKechnie's team opened with a blast of hits against the Robins yesterday to balance their slump of last week, only to be denied a victory by rain. The Pirates had piled up a 6 to 0 lead.

Meanwhile, the Giants clipped half a game from the margin of the National league leaders, following five hits. Ken Greenfield gave the Reds by a single run while the Giants were gathering five tallies off Eppa Rixey.

A big demand for world's series tickets developed when they were put on sale in Pittsburgh yesterday. Hotels are flooded with reservations.

The outlook of the leading Washington Senators in the American league, continues favorable. Yesterday, the champions balanced a Philadelphia triumph over the preceding White Sox by noosing out the Tigers, 5 to 3.

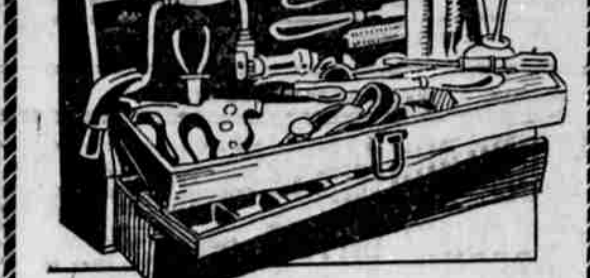
