## STUDEBAKER SIX MAKES LONG TRIP

In seven days the United States has been crossed by a closed automobile. Actual running time for 3,370 miles was 96 hours, 15 minutes. The car was a stock model Studebaker Standard Six coach.

A remarkable feature of the run was that a trained endurance driver, a vegetarian living on California fruits, gave up the drive at Kansas City when his home state products ran out, and the rest of the run was made in record time by an amateur who never had attempted such driving.

This, with the fact the car was a stock model Studebaker Standard Six Coach taken off the sales floor at Los Angeles, made the record run more nearly akin to the experience of the average motor car driver than any similar run ever made.

Mike H. Newman is the man who brought the coach from Kansas City, where it was two hours behind schedule, into New York City two hours ahead of running time, after having rested 15 extra hours in Philadelphia.

The car left Los Angeles on August 28 on the shot of the starting gun fired by Mayor George Cryer. An immense crowd cheered the drivers on their way.

No mechanical difficulty of any kind was experienced on the trip. Though it was a brand new Studebaker Coach, an average of 163 miles to the gallon of gasoline was achieved. The car arrived in New York in perfect condition, as did the driver, who enthusiastically proclaimed the Studebaker Coach the "sweetest running car" he had ever seen.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 15.—Jacob Dietz, of Oregon City, was adjudged guilty in justice court here Tuesday afternoon on a charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated. He was immediately sentenced by Justice of the Peace Small, to serve three months in the county jail, pay a fine of \$250 and lose his driver's license for a year. His car will be held by the authorities for three months.

The collision out of which the charge grew occurred when Dietz's automobile, in which were himself, his wife and a small son, clashed with a truck near St. Paul on Sunday, September 6. The wife and boy were severely hurt, the boy going to a hospital with a badly injured head.

Several witnesses for the defense declared there was no evidence that Dietz had been drinking, but Deputy Sheriff Bert Smith who handled the case at the time, said evidence of liquor was strong. Dietz is said to be a garbage hauler operating in Portland.

## TERRIFIC STORM HITS UNION AND WALLOWA COUNTIES

LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 15.—A terrific thunderstorm which swept over Union and Wallowa counties late yesterday took a toll of one life, delayed threshing in Wallowa county and caused an unestimated amount of damage to prune and apple orchards near Cove.

Wayne Willett, 23, of Wallowa, was killed by a bolt of lightning when he sought shelter from the storm under a tree. Willett's mother, bringing him a coat to the field where he and his mother were working, witnessed the death. Two horses were killed a few minutes later by another bolt of lightning. Hugo hallstones fell at Cove, smashing windows and severely damaging crops. The storm was not so severe here, and no great damage was reported. Rain has fallen here incessantly during the last fifteen hours.

### MOTOR TROUBLES ARE UNAVOIDABLE

Not all motor troubles are avoidable, but serious damage to any automobile engine may absolutely be averted by the observance, on the part of the same motorist, of two very simple rules: First, to give the car more-than-usual inspection, each morning, before setting out; second, to heed the advice of the motometer which is placed on the radiator cap, not for ornament, but specifically as an advance warning to motorists when some sort of trouble is stewing.

ing. This device will not tell the driver what is wrong—that is up to him to discover when he gets the danger signal—but it will tell him, in plenty of time, that something is wrong.

Incidentally, here is a list of possible troubles the motorist should look for in the case of both the early morning inspection and after he has received warning of trouble while on the road: Radiator leak, broken water pump, rotting of rubber hose connections, choked water passages, cylinder friction, loose oil pipe connections, clogged strainer, broken oil pump, worn piston rings, driving with retarded spark, improper timing, improper carburetor adjustment, broken fan belt and clogged muffler.
