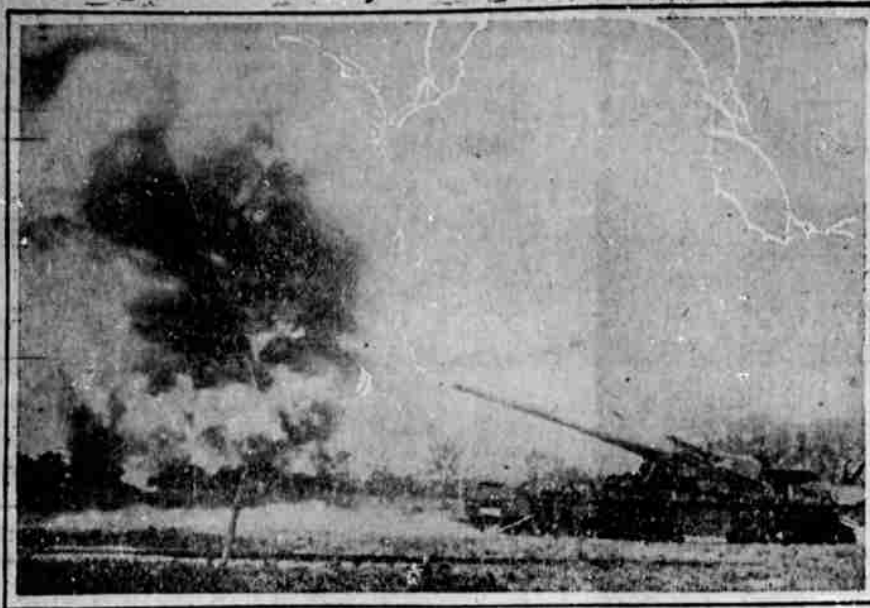


Big Berthas Ready for Trip Across Country
