GAME VIOLATIONS CHARGED AGAINST HUSBAND AND WIFE

Mrs. Lena Stoble, and her husband, Floyd Stoble, both residents of Camas Valley, were sentenced on two counts each for violations of the game laws in the Justice Court yesterday afternoon. Mrs. Stoble was fined \$75 for discharging the sex of a deer and \$50 for having an untaxed deer in her possession. Her husband was fined \$25 for acting as a guide without a permit and \$50 for wanton waste of game.

The couple was apprehended by Deputy Game Warden A. M. Fish and Charles H. McClees of Coos County and C. A. Herring, special deputy from Portland.

Mrs. Stoble, who is known as one of the best hunters of the county, had killed three deer, according to the officers, two of the animals being fine bucks, and the other of disguised sex. The deputy claims that he found the disguised deer in a sack hidden about 75 feet from the camp, the shoulders and hams being rounded out, and nothing to indicate the sex of the animal.

Mr. Stoble is accused to have packed a party into the woods and to have acted as guide, without first procuring a permit as required by the state law. He was also accused of having wantonly wasted meat.

They entered pleas of guilty to all charges and paid the fines assessed against them.
