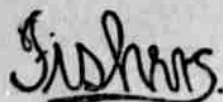


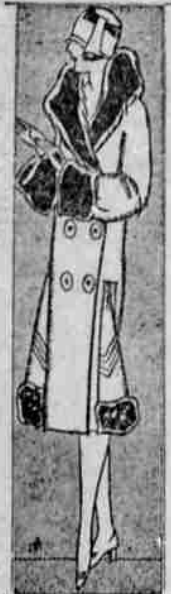

ROSEBURG WILL MAKE SHOWING AT PORTLAND

I. O. O. F. Delegation and Juvenile Band to Ap- pear in Parade.

BOYS GO WEDNESDAY

Arrangements Made for Transportation of Young- sters to Portland and for Their Care.

Roseburg is to be well represented in the meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., to be held in Portland, September 21-25. Fifty or more members of the Roseburg lodge will drive down from here, and the number will be augmented by thirty-five or more local members residing in Portland, so that the city will make a good showing. Some are already in Portland, while others will go the first of the week. The local Odd Fellows will take the Roseburg juvenile band to the convention on Wednesday to participate in the great parade.

The band will leave here at 4 a. m. on Wednesday morning, a large bus having been chartered to transport the thirty or more youthful musicians, who will play under the direction of Walter Germaine. The boys will appear in the parade in the afternoon on Wednesday and will start back Thursday morning.

A committee has been appointed to chaperone the boys while in Portland and they will be well cared for while away. They will be given reservations at the Balmier hotel, and if any of them have relatives with whom they desire to spend the night, members of the chaperoning committee will see that they reach their destination safely and are brought back to the hotel in time for the start home here on Thursday. Entertainment will also be provided for them on Wednesday night.

The entire Roseburg delegation will mark in the parade, together with the band. The Muscovite patrol team will march in uniform, although it will not participate in the competitive drill.

The meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge will bring together thousands of people from all over the United States and the different provinces of Canada. There also will be representatives present from Australasia, Cuba and other distant points. While there are but a limited number of representatives from each of the grand jurisdictions, there will be numerous delegates and fraternal teams on hand to compete for the prizes. Approximately \$10,000 is distributed for prizes for the best Canton, consisting of 21 Chevalliers and 3 officers. The second prize in this department will be \$500 and a third prize of \$300. Class B prize in the same department, which goes to 15 Chevalliers and 2 officers making the best appearance in the drill, is \$500, with a second prize of \$250 and a third prize of \$100.

Among the various degree teams listed from a distance is Garland Rebekah Lodge No. 359 from Detroit, Michigan. This team, which is composed of about fifty young women, will compete for the prize in the Rebekah degree. Another Rebekah team coming from the east is Vera Rebekah Lodge No. 12, of Helena, Montana. There are a number of other Rebekah teams from Canada and Washington. Some of the Oregon Lodges outside of Portland will take part in this contest. In the male branch of the order one of the most distant teams that will be on hand is the degree team of Excelsior Encampment No. 55 of Pottstown, Pennsylvania. This team will consist of about forty men, who will bring much equipment and other paraphernalia with them and no doubt will make an excellent exemplification of the work in all three degrees of the encampment branch of Odd Fellowship. This is the same team which carried off all three prizes at the Sovereign Grand Lodge gathering in Jacksonville, Florida, last year.

All of the degree teams, as well as hundreds of lodges scattered about in various parts of the country, will participate in the big Odd Fellows parade which takes place on Wednesday, September 23, on the streets of Portland. In this parade there will be at least twenty-five bands and numerous drum corps. Several bands from Portland will take part in the entertainment and it is expected that there will be music in different parts of the city during the entire time of the convention. When the Sovereign Grand Lodge was held in Boston there were fifty bands in the line of march on the day of the big parade. It was estimated that there were 50,000 members of the order in line at that place. Two years ago in Detroit, Michigan, there were equally as many.

Although the membership is not as great in the west, with the more than 60,000 members in the state of Washington and 45,000 members in Oregon, it is expected that there will be the largest parade that has ever taken place in Portland during the season.
