FOUR BEND TRACTS SOLD TO SETTLERS

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

BEND, Ore., Sept. 18.—The sale of four tracts of land on the Tumalo project was announced yesterday as the first concrete result of the campaign to secure 200 new settlers for the project. None of the sales were of a speculative nature. D. E. McLellan, project manager said.

Except for a deal two years ago this is the first sale of raw land in seven years. The tracts sold this week were each of 40 acres, half of the land being the \$1 an acre Carey Act land, while the balance sold for \$5 an acre.

Arthur Foster, manager of the land settlement committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce has been on the Tumalo project for three days and returned to Portland last night. A favorable report on the project to the Portland organization was promised by Foster in an address to the board of directors of the Bend Commercial club yesterday.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18.—Silas Barclay, a Klamath Indian, was brought to Portland today by a United States deputy marshal from Prineville, where Barclay was wounded Wednesday night in an attempt to escape from the jail. Barclay was taken to a hospital for treatment of wounds in his leg and back. He was shot when overtaken in the brush near the Prineville jail. Barclay will be held here to face federal liquor charges.

Barclay was arrested at Prineville Tuesday by Sheriff Yackey in company with a man who was suspected of larceny. Barclay had escaped from jail in Klamath Falls six months ago.

ROHNENSAND, Prussia, Sept. 18.—(A. P.)—A cross between a cow and a sheep in this district has been a source of much scientific and popular conjecture during the past year. SOVIET RUSSIA CHARGES FEK FOR LISTENING IN ON RADIO.

MOSCOW, Sept. 18.—Broadcasting in Soviet Russia is still in its infancy. It began only a year ago, after the Council of Commissars decreed permitting private individuals to own small amateur receiving sets.

There are four broadcasting stations in Moscow and one each in Leningrad, Kharkov and Kiev. The biggest Moscow broadcasting station, “Komintern,” works upon a wave length of 1,450 meters. It broadcasts daily concerts and newspaper information in the form of a radio-gazette, which is believed to be the only radio-newspaper in the world.

The other Moscow stations are of a smaller capacity. Political education seems to be the chief object of their broadcasting programs. Anti-religious propaganda is also finding its way through the broadcasting stations, which have special programs adapted for children and adults.

Three radio weeklies are published in Moscow, with a total circulation of more than 150,000.

Preliminary registration for the possession of receiving sets has now been abolished and the sale of radio receiving sets has been made free. A fee of \$1.50 must, however, be paid to the authorities for listening in. The manufacture of radio sets has been monopolized by the state, and the import of appliances from abroad is forbidden.

FOREST LOOKOUTS CALLED FROM POSTS

BEND, Ore., Sept. 18.—All lookouts in the Deschutes National Forest were brought in yesterday, marking the end of the 1925 forest fire season. Rains during the last few weeks made possible the removal of the lookouts earlier than a number of years, according to forestry officials.

Fire loss in the Deschutes forest this season has been the lowest ever recorded here. While the number of fires spotted, 136, during 1925 was about the same as during 1924, the average in 1925 was only 400 as against 14,452 during 1924.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Sept. 18.—Tad Jones, football coach at Yale, has answered recent attacks on the gridiron game.

Defending the sporting charges made by an unknown graduate football manager in newspaper articles, Jones told the Lion's club yesterday that the assertion that it cost \$20,000 to put a football player on the field was without “foundation.” “In my opinion football is the finest game in sports,” Coach Jones said.

“No other sport draws on the finest qualities a man possesses as does football. No other game calls forth and indicates his sense of fairness and sportsmanship.” Jones denied that “we go out after players.”
