I. O. O. F. MEETING AT PORTLAND TO BE WORLD GATHERING

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge, which meets in Portland September 21-25 is a world gathering. It is composed of representatives from each of the 17,000 Odd Fellow lodges in all parts of the world. There will also be representatives present from the Encampment branch of the order and one official representative from each of the Royal Arch assemblies. The Sovereign Grand Lodge as now constituted is a dignified gathering of men, the organization having been started more than a hundred years ago. The body will legislate for the 3,000,000 Odd Fellows in the world, having supreme authority over all branches of the order. Each jurisdiction will have two representatives from the subordinate lodges and two representatives from the Grand Encampments. In respect to the number of members in the different states, the representation in the body is the same.

Herbert A. Thompson, grand sire, from Detroit, Mich., is the ranking officer of the order. Each jurisdiction will have two representatives from the subordinate lodges and two representatives from the Grand Encampments. At the Grand Lodge in Jacksonville, last year, two important pieces of legislation that were adopted were the lowering of the age limit for admission in all branches of the order from twenty-one to eighteen years. Another was the changing of the term of the grand sire from two years to one year. This year there is likely to be legislation and helpful discussion concerning a change in the plan of finance. Odd Fellow lodges have been allowing the weekly scale and accident benefit. In many quarters, there is a feeling that this should be changed and benefits should be discretionary with each lodge as the local members judge needs. Another question that is claiming the attention of the membership is that of some plan to avoid the great loss each year arising from the dropping of members for non-payments of dues. This loss of members is annually lost to the organization; by this route, if it could be overcome, the increase in membership would go forward by leaps and bounds. There will also be a proposition presented to the organization to change the sessions from annual to bi-annual meetings. It is thought that the foundations of the order are now so thoroughly laid that it will be possible to dispense with the annual gathering.

The above are but a few of the many questions that will likely arise during the meeting. There will be scores of innovations presented at the gathering that will scarcely reach the count of them. Each member is likely to have a set plan of changing the ancient customs of the order, but the conservatives are usually in control, and make short shift of most of the propositions.
