## AMERICAN SWIMMER BLAMES HER TRAINER FOR SWIM FAILURE

Says She Could Have Gone Farther If She Had Not Been Ordered to Stop.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
NEW YORK, Sept. 18.—Gertrude Ederle, the American swimmer, said today on her arrival from Europe on the Mauretania that had not her trainer, Jakob Wolff, ordered her taken from the water too soon she believes that she would have been able to have gone much farther in her attempt to swim the English channel. Miss Ederle was within six miles of the Dover coast when the attempt was abandoned. She said she was not certain whether she could have completed the distance.  
Miss Ederle was at first held incommunicado by her chaperon, Miss Elsie Veita, who said the Women's Swimming association did not wish Miss Ederle to make any statements "until after certain matters had been cleared up." Miss Ederle finally was allowed to speak.  
"I could have gone on," she said, "but whether I would have finished or no one could tell. I stopped because Helmy, (the Egyptian swimmer) touched me, and that was disqualification."  
"What made him do that?" she was asked.  
"Ask Wolff," she replied.  
Miss Ederle said she would like to try to swim the channel again. Miss Charlotte Eppstein of the Women's Swimming association was asked why she had notified Miss Veita not to allow Miss Ederle to talk.  
"Because I did not want any half-baked statements," was her reply.  
"There have been many things," said Miss Eppstein, "which should be investigated. In one of Miss Veita's letters she stated that Wolff came in one day and told Miss Ederle that sharks had been seen in the channel. This frightened the girl. Anyone who knows the channel knows that sharks could not exist there."  
When Miss Ederle was asked if she had become sick in the water or exhausted she said no. She replied that she may have coughed.  
From several passengers it was learned that Miss Ederle had attributed the loss of her chance at having become dizzy from a tight band about her head.  
Miss Ederle was excited by the confusion growing out of the refusal of her mentors to allow her to talk. When Miss Eppstein allowed her to answer a few questions it was difficult for her to hold back tears.  
According to Coach Handley, Miss Ederle's failure may be attributed to the training by Jakob Wolff. He added, however, that Wolff would be given an opportunity to defend himself.  
"The suspicion is indicated," Handley said, "that Miss Ederle was taken out of the water prematurely. Motion pictures show that she sat up in the boat. If she had been exhausted she would have collapsed."

## JUVENILE AIRCRAFT MODELS WILL COMPETE FOR HONORS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 18.—Young America, with a bent for aircraft, is now engaged in building and operating toy models to be flown in conjunction with the more spectacular national air races to be held at Mitchell Field, N. Y., October 4, 9 and 10. Officials of the National Aeronautic Association here, which is sponsoring the contest, believe that in flying augurs well for the future of aviation in the United States.  
The Mulvill Model Trophy will be awarded the winner of this contest, with eight prizes, ranging from \$200 to \$10, open to competition. Hand-launched, model airplanes, driven by rubber strand motors will figure in the duration race. The maximum number of contestants is 60.  
No restrictions are placed on the design of the model, except that it shall have a wing span of 40 inches maximum. The only motive power allowed is that derived from the use of rubber bands.  
The aeronautical terms used by the juvenile fliers, officials of the National Aeronautic Association, would do credit to automobile engineers. The young contestants often use Japanese paper, with the white of an egg for glue, to make the wings as light as possible. Egg beaters are brought into play to turn the rubber bands, which furnish the motive power, to a nicety.  
The winner at Dayton, O., last year was Robert V. Jares of Chicago, and several other Chicago boys won places in the unique contest.
