DIAMOND LAKE OBJECTIVE OF MANY TOURISTS

Hundreds of Cars Came No Further North Than Medford and Lake.

FIRE LOSS LOW

Forest Supervisor Summarizes Work for Summer—Forces Are Being Withdrawn.

Over one-half of the cars at Diamond Lake this year were from California, and came to that place as their final objective, and upon completion of the visit by the parties went directly back to California, according to Forest Supervisor Carl H. Neal, who with his family returned last night from an extended trip through Eastern Oregon.

"The fame of Diamond Lake as a resort is rapidly spreading throughout California," Mr. Neal says, "and hundreds of cars from that state visited the lake this year. These cars went in from Medford, and went back out the same way, in particular every case, and came no further north than Medford. It is plainly evident that with the completion of the North Umpqua Road that most of these will go in by way of Medford and come back through Roseburg.

"We have had a number of applications for summer home sites on Diamond Lake, most of these coming from the San Francisco vicinity."

Mr. Neal is very anxious to see the North Umpqua road completed, not alone from the commercial value which the road will have, but largely because of the added facilities it will give for fire protection, for at present all supplies for Diamond Lake and Big Camas must be hauled around by Medford, while the distance would be shortened more than

FARMER WHO KILLED AUTOIST FACES GRAND JURY THIS AFTERNOON

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Sept. 19.—The Yamhill county grand jury was called in special session here today by District Attorney Earl Nitz, to decide whether James F. Trent, farmer, is to be held for the killing Tuesday night of George Hamlin of Portland and wounding his father, P. E. Hamlin.

The fire season this year passed with comparatively small loss. Mr. Neal states. There were 40 fires, 24 of which were caused by lightning, and 16 of which were man-caused. Of these 16 fires convictions were obtained in 7 cases.

There were three fires over 10 acres in size, 2 fires between one-fourth acre and 10 acres in size, and 25 less than a quarter acre. Altogether fire burned over 272 acres, one fire, that at Grassy Ranch, being 210 acres in extent. The cost of fire prevention was \$2,500.

The fire prevention forces are now being withdrawn, the rains having eliminated all danger from forest fires. The lookouts are closing their stations and making them secure for the winter, while tools are being cleaned and oiled and stored away for the wet season.
