**PORTLAND SMILES ON I. O. O. F. HOST**

(Associated Press Special Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 21.—The sovereign grand lodge convention of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, which will be in session here until Friday, opened with a public welcome and reception meeting at the Municipal auditorium. Following the grand lodge session this morning, the delegates will be taken on a trip over the Columbia river highway this afternoon.

Portland is gaily decorated with colors emblematic of the order, and some of the main streets are arched with festoons of evergreens. Uniformed teams and bands are here from all parts of the United States and many from Canada.

The general military council of the Odd Fellows and the Association of Rebekah assemblies also opened their annual gatherings here today.

Grand Sire Herbert A. Thompson of Detroit, Michigan, in his annual address in opening the 101st annual communication of the Odd Fellows, recommended that action be taken permitting the admission to the order of races of color the world over.

The request was formally presented to him by the grand lodge of the Netherlands, which reported that men residing in the Dutch East Indies wished to join the fraternity. The grand lodge of the Netherlands urged that this be allowed.

"More liberal legislation on the race question," said Thompson, "will put us in position to better get the attention of and to influence people of 'strange cities and distant states.' If we are jealous of prestige, power and influence for this great institution of ours, we must be in position to meet the people of the world unhampered by restrictive racial legislation."

An address of welcome was given by the Rev. Henry Young of Hermiston, grand master of the I. O. O. F. grand lodge of Oregon.

Governor Pierce, who has been a member of the order for 42 years, in an address suggested that all the visitors take the trip around the Mount Hood loop and also go on the Columbia River Highway as far as The Dalles. He wished them to note the millions upon millions of horsepower that may be secured from the Columbia River, when it is harnessed.

He also advised a trip to Crater Lake to "see that Gem of all Gems on the Pacific coast, where a tower of water reflects the blue of the most beautiful of skies."
