## SCHOOLS FOR ALIENS IS AIM OF COUNCIL

Mrs. Edith Ackert, county school superintendent, reports that the state Americanization Council, together with the state educational department, is to be very active during the winter months. This council is organized for the purpose of providing educational facilities for aliens who are desirous of becoming naturalized. The naturalization law requires that an alien must be able to read and write English and must know the fundamentals of American history and government. Schools to teach such persons are being formed, under the direction of the council, which is headed by A. C. Strang as superintendent and it is expected that many will be enrolled. Several applications have already been received by Mrs. Ackert, and interested persons should communicate with her.

### FRENCH PROPOSAL ON U. S. DEBT NOW READY FOR TENDER

ABOARD S. S. PARIS, Sept. 21.—Finance Minister Caillaux and his colleagues on the French mission to the United States today completed the text of the proposals which they will lay before the American debt funding commission. Since the voyage from Havre began, the delegates have been devoting some hours daily to consultations upon what should be paid to the Americans and the form in which it should be paid.

One of the most troublesome parts of the document concerns transfers of money to America and how those can be made without disturbing exchange and depreciating the franc.

### FATAL AIRPLANE SPIN NOT FAULT OF PILOTS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 21.—Yesterday's airplane crash at the national guard flying circus, in which Lieutenant Schuyler Priestley and Private John S. Avey were killed, was due to an accident, not through any misconduct of the men here, it was declared by a military board of national guard aviation officers, which made public its report today.

## OREGON PRIZE ESSAY CONTEST RULES GIVEN

A number of schools of Douglas County are interested in the All-Oregon 1925 Exposition prize essay contest for high schools and grade schools. The contest is being held at Mrs. Edith Ackert, county school superintendent. This contest always draws replies from all sections of the state, and Douglas County schools in the past have stood high in the essay work. Mrs. Ackert has received the contest rules, which are as follows:

Prizes: High School contest—\$50, first; \$20, second; \$10, third. Grade School Contest—\$25, first; \$10, second; \$5, third.

General Subjects: (1) Oregon-made products, or (2) the educational and cultural values of art. Student may choose his own title provided it falls within the compass of either of the above. (See further discussion on following pages.)

Length: Essays must not exceed 500 words.

Physical Form: Essays must be written legibly in ink or (preferably) type-written.

Closing Date: Essays must be in the hands of the Secretary of the All-Oregon 1925 Exposition committee, 651 Court House, Portland, Oregon, not later than October 15.

Judges: Judge Charles H. Carey, Anthony Euwer and Dean Eric W. Allen.

The suggested titles:

1. The Economic Importance of Oregon-Made Goods.
2. Oregon's Basic Industries and Their Relation to the Welfare of the State.
3. The Value of a State-Wide Oregon Products Exposition.
4. Art as an Expression of the Characteristic Culture of a State.
5. Art as Essential in the Education of a People.
6. The Value of an Oriental Art Exhibit to the Pacific Coast.

Essays must be written legibly in ink or (preferably) type-written, double-spaced, and have wide margins. The size of paper should be 8 1/2 by 11 inches. The contestants should write on one side of the paper only.

Essays must not exceed 500 words. Any exceeding 500 words will not be considered by the judges of the contest.

All direct quotations in essays must be enclosed in quotation marks.

Adelphi Terrace, now tenanted by Bernard Shaw, Sir James Barrie, the ghost of David Garrick and many of the wags and witesses who have made the Terrace Club a celebrated Bohemian haunt in London, is to be wrecked.

The news of the impending change came as a shock to those who love old London. It is thought Mount Olympus was to be levelled to make a foundation for Mammon's Temple and the pastures where Pegasus grazed were to be converted into a parking place for automobiles.

Final agreement for the destruction of the terrace has not been signed, although it is anticipated to have reached a conclusive stage.

Plans are well advanced for the annual conference of the Finnish labor party which will be held here this month in Liverpool.

The executive has elected a number of draft resolutions which are remarkable in that they indicate the decided tendency toward modified form of imperialism which has been for some time

evident among labor leaders in parliament.

Opposition will be encountered to this, however, and amendments already have been prepared designed to bring the convention back to the old standpoint of labor policy, prominent in which are such tenets as nationalization and the capital levy.

One amendment, for instance, asks the conference to "repudiate the imperialistic utterances of certain labor leaders." From Manchester he demanded the capital levy and the suspension of war loan interest on holdings more than 50,000 pounds sterling, with the raising of death duties to three-fourths of the amount of estates.

The communist controversy again will be well to the fore. One influential union, the transport and general workers union and several local labor groups, will ask the conference to declare against labor, while a minority party in the house of commons iron again accepting the responsibilities of government.

BERLIN, Sept. 19.—President von Hindenburg's friends and political advisers are greatly pleased over the impression the German chief executive made upon the people of Bavaria during the four weeks vacation there recently.

The trip was not only in the nature of a holiday, but was a political experiment to see how the Germans would take to popularizing the president by showing him off in various sections of the country. This first attempt proved a 100 percent success, for wherever von Hindenburg appeared, he was the recipient of water-boated ovations.

Berlin smokers are up in arms in what they say is usurpation of their cars on the elevated and interurban and street railways by women.

Protests from all quarters are being launched in the streets. One writer urges the organization of a smoker society with the object of instituting a general movement against this infringement on their rights. Attention is called to the paradox that woman, with a pronounced and much advertised antipathy to smoke of every description, are invariably to be found in a smoldering car, enveloped in a bluish haze of tobacco smoke, while the inveterate smoker is condemned to stand outside on the platform or, which is much worse, to sacrifice the greater part of a perfectly good cigar before entering a non-smoker.

At Oberammergau an interesting anniversary is being celebrated that involves the family of Antea Lang, who represents Christ in the passion play. A wood carving firm known as G. Lang, successively has completed 100 years of existence. The records show that George Lang, who founded the firm in 1775, not only was himself an expert wood carver, but by business ability and his extensive commercial relations helped Oberammergau greatly in the development of its wood working trade.

His sons, grandsons and later descendants kept the firm's reputation topnotch so that Lang crucifixes, Christ figures and other religious representations still are in much demand.

Four posthumous works of Robert Schumann, German composer, have been included in a new Schumann collection just published by the Schott Publishing House at Mayence. These hitherto unknown compositions, conforming with the composer's well known eccentric collection are: "Cuckoo in Hiding," "Jaggon of Yessee," "Catch Who Catch Can," and a waltz.

A complete edition of the works of Carl Maria von Weber also is about to be published. This work is to be done by the musical edition of the German academy with the collaboration of a number of prominent experts, under guidance of Professor G. F. Moner of the University of Heidelberg.

PARIS, Sept. 19.—For those who have been waiting for the information, a leading authority on the French dressmaking world has declared: "We need not expect any marked change in women's shape this winter."

The women of Paris will persist in keeping to the straight and slender line so becoming to the figure. But as some change must be made, the dressmakers have hit upon the expedient of trimming the backs of dresses, which is

the latest remedy for France's dwindling population.

A bill has been drafted by deputy Charles Lambert, removing most of the formalities and expensive fees attendant to becoming a citizen of the republic. Among other facilities provided, foreigners marrying French women may claim naturalization at once while others will have the qualifying period reduced from 10 years to three.

Maurice Bokanowski, one of the delegates of the French debt mission now on the way to the United States, was perhaps not chosen as a delegate for that reason, but he is generally regarded as having been born under a lucky star and to be immune from consequences of shipwreck or other disasters.

He was aboard the French auxiliary cruiser La Provence, the old transatlantic liner, when it was torpedoed in the Adriatic during the war. He floated around in the water several hours before he was picked up and now is supposed to live a charmed life.

Henri Berenger, ranking member of the mission after the finance minister, has to his credit as his latest achievement, the fact that he struck oil in southern France.
