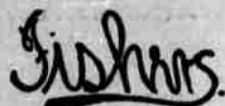

"AUNT PHOEBE" KETCHELL FOUND DEAD IN HER HOME

"Aunt Phoebe" Ketchell, one of Roseburg's best known women, was found dead this afternoon in her little home on Fowler street. She apparently dropped dead suddenly of heart failure, shortly after arising this morning. Her body was found by a neighbor shortly after 1 o'clock this afternoon, and at that time she had been dead for a number of hours. The condition of the house indicated that her death occurred shortly after she had eaten her morning meal. "Aunt Phoebe," as she was known by all her friends, was born in Iowa, and would have been 83 years of age on the 18th of next month. She was one of a family of 10 children, her brother, Robert Troxel, of this city, being the only surviving member of that family. In 1859 her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Troxel, crossed the plains, and with them she came to Oregon, the family taking up a claim on Deer creek, where her marriage to John Vinson occurred. Following his death she was married to Louis Jones, and her marriage to Chris Ketchell, now deceased, was in later years. She leaves besides her aged brother, five children, Robert Vinson of Montana, William Vinson of Coles Valley, Olive Anderson of Portland, Jennie Sidmore of Tacoma, and Mary Fox of Hooker, Cal. She also leaves three grandchildren.

For many years Mrs. Ketchell was employed by Douglas county, conducting the county home, where the Roseburg Lumber and Manufacturing company's mill now stands. In more recent years she has been residing alone in her home on Fowler street. Arrangements for the funeral services have not yet been made.

PHILADELPHIA IS CHOSEN BY GRAND LODGE I. O. O. F.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 22.—Philadelphia was chosen for the next annual meeting of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows by unanimous vote of the delegates at the 101st communication of the order here today. The meeting will be held the third Monday in September. The Sovereign Grand Lodge voted, 196 to 18, to amend the constitution to provide that no representative shall be admitted to the sovereign grand lodge without having taken the patriarchs militant degree. The amendment has been discussed in many other sessions of the sovereign grand lodge, but has never before been able to muster the necessary three-fourth majority. The sovereign grand lodge voted down a proposal for establishment of one or more sanitariums for treatment of members of the order suffering from tuberculosis.

MARRIED YESTERDAY

LUMBERMEN VIEW MERGERS AS MARKET SAVING MEASURE

SEATTLE, Sept. 22.—Robert B. Allen, secretary-manager of the West Coast Lumbermen's Association, told a meeting of Seattle credit men yesterday that extensive consolidations and mergers will be made in the manufacturing end of the lumber industry to solve the marketing problem. He said the present year witnessed a record-breaking production of lumber although the manufacturers did not profit as they should because of the weakness of the selling organizations. Mills were compelled to sell on a buyers' market. Thus far this year, the Pacific northwest produced more lumber than in any like period. Notwithstanding this heavy production, the industry today is oversold.

YOUNG RATTLEERS REARED ON WHITE MICE IN MUSEUM

MINNEAPOLIS, Sept. 22.—Eight tiny rattlesnakes—bitten, rattles and all—at the Minneapolis museum represent the first young born of rattlesnakes which mated after being placed in captivity, in the belief of Miss Grace R. Wiley, curator, whose contention is supported by famous naturalists and the Pittman of New York City. The young were born to one of three genuine rattlers which, until three years ago, roamed the plains of Texas. The original litter numbered eleven, but three died shortly after birth. The remaining eight fed principally upon white mice, are growing rapidly. They measured 12 inches in length at the second month, twice that at birth. The baby rattlers are kept in a small box separate from the glass case containing the parents and other members of the snake colony. The female snake, not being little to care for her young after birth, so Miss Wiley segregated them until they were strong enough to protect themselves from being crushed by the large ones sniling about the cage. Small white mice, raised by the museum, are the only food given the young while the grown serpents are denied such luxuries as a regular diet.

BRUTAL MURDER OF WOMAN RESULTS IN FIREMAN'S ARREST

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Mrs. Sophie Poleski, whose body was found today in the furnace of an East Side lumberyard kiln, was placed in the furnace while alive and burned to death. Medical Examiner Schwartz was called to the scene. Two fractures were found on the woman's skull. George Symak, fireman of the furnace, was charged with Mrs. Poleski's death. Symak said the woman often visited him at the yard and that she once threatened to poison him. When she brought him two bottles of wine this morning, he suspected that she had placed poison in the wine. He said he beat her over the head with a bottle and then carried her body to the furnace room. Police said Mrs. Poleski was gagged before being placed in the furnace. Detectives found John Poleski, the dead woman's husband, in bed at home with a serious wound on the head. He was held for questioning.

INSTALLMENT CRAZE BRINGS HUMOROUS JAB

WELLESLEY, Mass., Sept. 22.—Attacks upon the defenses of the "dollar down and dollar a week" system of buying in America were heard today at the twelfth annual national business conference at Babson Park, a suburb. "If the present rate of increase of installment sales continues it will only be a short time before a housewife will order a steak on the agreement that she is to pay ten cents a week for it," said William Nelson Taft, editor of the Retail Ledger.
