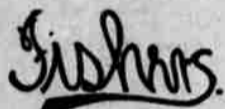

TWO CLASSES ARE STRICKEN FROM STATE FAIR LIST

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 23.—(Special.)—Two classes, that of professional and amateur photography, have been eliminated from the competitive classes in the art department of the state fair year, this ruling going into effect following a recent action, which complies with a similar one made at the recent convention in San Francisco, of the Pacific International Photographer's Association.

The finest pictures shown at the state fair this year. The collection will include the very best specimens under the following classes: portraiture, commercial photography and color work. The exhibit will be representative of ninety percent of the studios of the Northwest. Members of the Willamette Valley Photographers' Association, who have shown unprecedented interest in the forthcoming display, are asked to send in their best works, the closing date for entries to be the day before the opening of the fair, September 28th.

There will be two hundred and fifty pictures in the Pacific International exhibit, with ninety pictures representative of commercial photography. J. H. Gansler, of Portland, who hung the northern section's pictures at San Francisco, will be in Salem to place the exhibit. Groups will be arranged as they were in California, so that the different types of photographs will be readily discernible by the public, and to further the interest in the display Miss Kathryn Gunnell of Salem, will be on hand each afternoon to answer questions regarding the artists who made the pictures; what constitutes quality in photographic work, and anything else that may puzzle state fair patrons.

The rating system which will go into effect at the 1926 Photographic Convention to be held in Seattle, will be used in making up the premium list for the state fair art department next year. This is the first time that an exhibit of this kind has been shown in Salem, but hereafter the state fair will be in line for the first showing of the Pacific International travelling exhibit, the date of the fair following as it does so closely after the larger convention.
