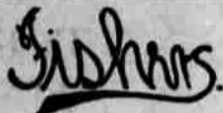

FORMER ROSEBURG WOMAN DIES

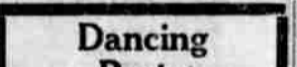
Word was received here yesterday by Mrs. L. LaMere that her niece, Mrs. Mathew Sargent, of Tillamook, passed away Tuesday at her home there. News of her death comes as a shock to her many friends in Roseburg. Before her marriage to Mathew Sargent, she was Miss Pauline Winingham, was born and raised in Coos county and following her marriage, seven years ago, she moved to Roseburg, making her home here for several years. Last spring Mr. and Mrs. Sargent moved to Tillamook, since that time making their home at that place. She was twenty-three years old at the time of death. Besides her husband, and three children, Lyle, aged 6; Ruby, aged 4, and Goldie, aged 2 years, she leaves a number of relatives in this city, and many friends in Coos county, Roseburg and Tillamook. Details of the funeral arrangements were not given.

TWO SHENANDOAH ENGINES FAILED IN LINE SQUALL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LAKEHURST, N. J., Sept. 25.—Re-examined today before the naval court of inquiry, Colonel C. G. Hall, United States army observer aboard the Shenandoah on her fatal flight, said his statement of yesterday that the failure of two engines of the ship furnished a possible contributing factor to the disaster was more in the nature of an assumption than a statement of fact. In his testimony yesterday, Colonel Hall expressed the opinion that the failure of two of the ship's five engines made more probable the drawing of the big craft into the vortex of the storm which wrecked her after a spectacular flight of fifteen minutes. One engine went out because of a cracked cylinder and the other because of a radiator leakage. An opinion that the reported failures of the engines of the Shenandoah were minor in character and not a contributing cause to the disaster was given by S. S. Halliburton, chief machinist's mate and assistant engineer officers of the ship.

ODD FELLOWS NOT READY TO ACCEPT MAORIS IN LODGE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 25.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, in annual convention here, today voted to postpone indefinitely action on a recommendation from Carl P. S. Glasgow, grand sire of Australia, that the Maoris of New Zealand be declared eligible to membership in the order. Glasgow urged recognition of the Maoris, but H. W. Borst, past grand sire, and others opposed it, contending that such recognition at this time would open endless avenues for difficulty with the race and color question in the United States.

DOUGLAS COUNTY PAYS IN \$6400 ON VEHICLE FUND

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., Sept. 25.—A total of \$62,500 was apportioned to the state highway fund and \$27,500 to the counties, for the period from March 16 to September 15 from moneys received from motor vehicle and motor vehicle operator registrations. Amounts received by counties included: Deschutes \$6,443; Douglas \$6,400; Jackson \$9,787; Klamath \$10,616; Lane \$14,800; Umatilla \$7,710.

JUDGE HARRIS TO SPEAK FOR ELKS AT SALEM TEMPLE

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 25.—Representatives from all Elks lodges in Oregon and Washington are expected in the new Elks temple here, which has been dated for Saturday, November 7. Invitations are to be sent out in a short time. Judge Lawrence T. Harris, of Eugene, former member of the state supreme court, will deliver the dedicatory address, and Ben S. Fisher of Marshfield, newly appointed district deputy grand exalted ruler, will preside as representative of Grand Exalted Ruler W. H. Atwell. An extensive program is being prepared, which will be concluded with a banquet at night.

BEERMAKER TELLS STORY OF BRIBING FEDERAL KEEPERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—Frank Lake, brewer and federal prisoner, confessed from the prison stand today that he and his partner, Terry Druggan, paid \$2,000 a month for privileges to Wesley Westbrook, former jail warden, and Federal Judge Wilkerson ordered Westbrook, Hans Thompson, former assistant superintendent of the jail and Henry Foerst, formerly Westbrook's secretary, taken into custody. A deputy marshal was sent out for Westbrook, who the judge said must be in court. The others were turned over to the marshal. Westbrook yesterday denied that he ever had received money from Lake or Druggan. He was not in court today.

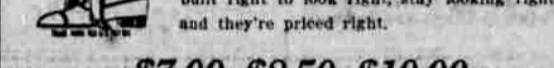
