Great Deposit Found by Henry Strader Largest in United States— Said to Be 95 %

Discovery of a vein of pottery clay, the only one known to exist in Oregon, was reported today by Henry Strader of this city, who has filed claims on the location on two miles up Honey Creek from the North Umpqua road. Pottery clay is more valuable than gold, it is claimed, and millions of tons of it are shipped in annually from China, the greatest source of the product.
