Creation of States

MAKE EIGHT MONTHS TRIP FOR SHORT LOOK AT SUN
WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—An eight months' trip half way around the world for two minutes of actual work will be the experience of a party from the Naval Observatory that has left to observe the total eclipse of the sun in January 1926 at Sumatra in the Dutch East Indies.

British, German and French parties also will be at Sumatra, as well as a party from Swarthmore College. The Italians will have an observation party in eastern Africa.

The American naval group will endeavor to observe phenomena in connection with the upward curve of the sunspot cycle, and will study the sun's corona as well. Motion pictures and color plates of the eclipse will be made. Special attention will be given to the sun's gases, which scientists say extend

as far as two million miles from the sun's rim when the moon blots out its face.

The party will travel on the naval minesweeper Bittern from Manila to Sumatra. It expects to reach its destination in October and the three months' interim before the eclipse occurs on January 11—visible only from Africa to the Indian Ocean—will be spent in erecting housing and telescope towers.

Lieutenant Henry C. Kellers, a naval doctor, has been detailed to the expedition at the request of the Smithsonian Institution, to collect specimens of birds, mammals, and insects. The others in the party are Captain Frank B. Littell, Professor of Mathematics; George H. Peters, associate astronomer; G. M. Raynsford, junior astronomer; and Dr. John A. Anderson of Mt. Wilson Observatory, Pasadena, Calif., physicist.

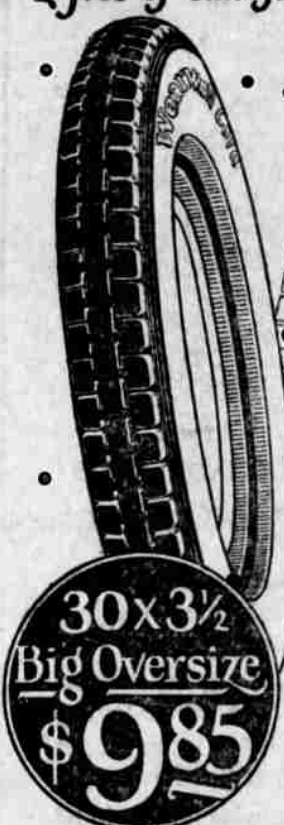
AUSTRALIA NEARS SIX MILLION

RADIO SERVICE TO FLASH RETURNS ON BASEBALL CLASSIC

World Series Games to Be Broadcast Play by Play, Associated Press Arrangement.

(Associated Press Linked Wire.)

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—During what bids fair to be the greatest World's series in the history of baseball, the ether this year will be saturated as never before in the history of radio, with simultaneous wire pictures of the play, which will be broadcast by member newspapers of the Associated Press.

No matter whether a radio "listener" lives on the eastern seaboard or the west coast, or on the Canadian border, or the shores of the Gulf, this year he can "see" every play of the series, exactly as it happens and at the moment it takes place, without leaving his own parlor.

In one of the most ambitious projects ever undertaken in the reporting of a sporting event, the World series report of the Associated Press for the first time in the history of that organization will be put "on the air" when Washington and Pittsburgh clash in the annual baseball classic next week.

By special arrangement 75 newspapers scattered throughout almost every state in the union, will broadcast the play-by-play story of the games as reported by a picked staff of Associated Press sportsmen on the field. So thoroughly do these newspapers "blanket" the country, that even the simplest home made set, no matter what corner of the country it is in, will be easily able to pick up the nearest station.

As each ball is pitched the fact will be told by sports writers to telegraphers who have made reputations for speed, and will be shot across the country on leased wires. As the story appears word by word from the telegraph wires in the newspaper offices where the broadcasting is to be done it will be repeated into microphones.

RUSSIAN CHURCH CONCLAVE SUMMONED BY HOLY SYNOD

MOSCOW, Oct. 2.—(A. P.)—The third all-Russian church convclave was announced to start tomorrow in the large cathedral of Christ the Savior.

The convclave was summoned by the Holy Synod, which is the only orthodox ecclesiastical authority recognized by the Soviet government. Its chief object will be the liquidation of the dissensions in the orthodox church which originated with the dedication of the late Patriarch Tikhon. Since the latter's death the tension between the two leading groups—the Tikhonites and the reformists supporting the Holy Synod—has been somewhat appeased, and the Holy Synod is now inviting the Tikhonite Bishops to participate in the convclave and to join in discussing means of adopting Russian church life to the conditions of the Soviet political regime.

The Holy Synod unites more than 60 per cent of Russian orthodox faithful. The numerous ecclesiastical groups which were formed in the beginning of the split in the Russian orthodox church in 1921 have now either Tikhon's followers or the Holy Synod. Thus, the only two parties in the Russian church remain the Tikhonites, which are headed by the "black" clergy and are opposed to any reforms in the church, and the Holy Synod, which is supported by the secular clergy and which wants to bring Russian church life in conformity with present conditions.

The newly elected eccumenical Patriarch Basil, the former Niccean Metropolitan, is expected to attend in order to help the reestablishment of the Russian church.
