MAKESHIFT DEBT TERMS ONLY MAKE SITUATION WORSE

PARIS, Oct. 2. — The first tangible effect here of the temporary debt settlement offer in Washington was to send the dollar from 21.10 francs at the opening of the bourse to 21.30 at 1 p. m.

A pessimistic view of the events in Washington was manifest in official circles, where opinion prevails that the temporary arrangement for annual payment of forty million each for the next five years had served to complicate the whole debt situation.

It was felt that the course events had taken would make it extremely difficult for parliament to accept the provisional arrangement because of the uncertainty involved and the belief that the termination of the five year period would find France faced with the same or perhaps more serious problems than she is meeting now.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The French debt commission, which will sail for Paris tonight on the liner La France, arrived at 12:30 p. m. today. Members of the commission including Finance Minister Cailiaux, expected to devote much of the afternoon to sight seeing. The finance minister obtained all available morning papers at a city enroute from Washington and after reading their accounts of yesterday's proceedings declared he found them "fair and impartial."

TOKYO, Oct. 2. — Further details of the great rainstorm of Wednesday night show that 20 persons were killed in Yokohama and six in Yokosuka by landslides. Fifty houses were razed by the slides and other damage was done, particularly to the railroads, many miles of which were washed away by flood waters. In Toyo, 42,000 houses were partly submerged, but otherwise the damage done was not serious.

PIERCE'S ALLEGED DRY SLEUTHS ARE PUT UNDER ARREST

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 2. — Robert Smith and A. C. Smith, said to be special state prohibition agents of Governor Walter M. Pierce, were arrested here today on secret federal indictments charged with conspiracy to violate the prohibition law, with selling liquor and taking it for their own use, with demanding money to keep from making arrests of law violators, and with selling moonshine taken in a raid on a still in Marion county.

Robert and A. C. Smith, are sons of former Warden Johnston Smith of the Oregon state penitentiary. They surrendered today to United States Marshal Hutchins and were released on \$2,000 bail, posted by Milton A. Miller and Dr. J. W. Morrow.

Arthur Christensen, former federal prohibition agent, and said to have been acting as special state agent in Astoria, was indicted on the same charges as those facing the Smith Brothers. An additional charge of transportation of liquor was lodged against Christensen. Christensen was already under arrest on another charge and was out on \$500 bail. His bail was increased to \$2,000 under the new charge.
