DEPUTY SHERIFF IS INDICTED BY JURY AT MEDFORD

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 3.—L. D. Fornerook, deputy sheriff was indicted by the grand jury Friday afternoon on two counts, both misdemeanors, under the law, charging malfeasance and neglect in office, and receiving and delaying the service of a warrant of arrest. The substance of the charges against Fornerook are as follows: A warrant was issued for the arrest of Walter Williams, a youth living with his parents at Gold Hill, charging rape. Fornerook took the warrant, and went to the Williams home, where he found the young man, and hesitated to put him in the county jail, accepting the promise of his parents to bring him to the county seat the next day. The next day young Williams fled, and his whereabouts are unknown. The parents of Williams, pioneer residents of the Gold Hill district, are held under \$500 bonds for appearance as witnesses in the case. Deputy Fornerook is at liberty on his own recognizance and still attending to his deputy duties. Sheriff Jennings said he had not taken any action in the case as yet. Fornerook has been a deputy sheriff for five years, and regarded as a highly efficient officer and finger print expert. He served under former Sheriff Terrill. J. S. Wheaton was indicted for larceny. He stands charged with the theft of a \$75 mirror, a sewing machine and other household effects, belonging to J. M. Riddon of Ashland. C. A. Ramsay was indicted for larceny by bailie, and is accused of appropriating an automobile belonging to J. M. Dennison of this city.

EXPERTS GIVE EDGE TO WASHINGTON IN BASEBALL CLASSIC (Associated Press Special Wire.) NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—(By The Associated Press)—Washington and Pittsburgh will go into the World's Series next Wednesday as closely matched as any contenders in recent years for baseball's highest honors. This conclusion is apparent from the analysis of the cogs in the two machines. If either club is to be given an edge, however, expert opinion conceives it is Washington on the strength of superior experience, defensive steadiness and the pitching prowess of Johnson and Covelleski, plus the faculty which the present world champions have of rising to emergencies. The Pirates, to offset these assets of their rivals, have greater youth, speed and batting punch, a combination which their followers are confident will break down the defensive bulwarks of the veteran Washington outfit. Pittsburgh's array is the more likely to tint the series play with brilliance, for the club has some of the games most spectacular individual performers in Traynor, Wright, Cuyler and Carey. On the other hand, Washington's big stars, Harris, Peck, Goslin and Rice—have repeatedly shown their ability to meet a crisis with a sensational bit of batting or fielding.
