LABOR FEDERATION MEMBERSHIP FAR UNDER 1920 TOTAL

Court Injunctions, Child Labor and Communism Opposed—Advice on Banking.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 5.—(A. P.)—Outstanding accomplishments in a year of growth and activity were reported today to the American Federation of Labor by William Green, its president, and the members of the executive council.

The year gave the federation a total membership of 2,878,297 persons, the report said, and marked the first year in six in which there was no loss of union strength. It was a gain of approximately 13,000 over the 1924 membership, though the total still was at a mark considerably below the high point of 1920, when it was 3,078,749.

There was no weakening in the re-statement of hostility to the use of court injunctions in labor disputes. Likewise, the report amplified the federation's position in opposition to communists, and declared that communist organizations and activities were "infiltrating the union movement."

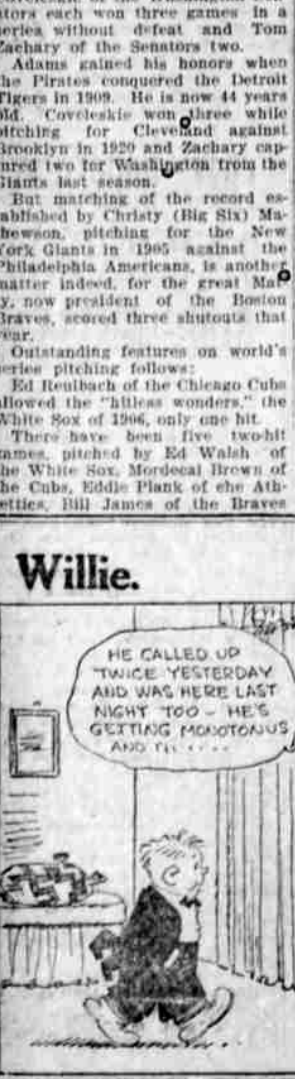
