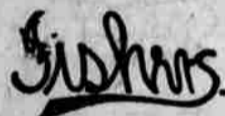

THREE GREEKS ARE HELD IN JAIL FOR INVESTIGATION

Tony Angelus, Sam Plastino and Eddie Grills, three Greeks claiming Seattle as their residence, were arrested this morning on Rice Hill, and were brought to Roseburg, where they were charged with carrying concealed weapons in their automobile. The three men are alleged to have stopped at a filling station at Springfield Junction this morning and to have started south without paying for the gasoline obtained.

At Cottage Grove an attempt was made to stop them, according to word received by Sheriff Starmer, but the trio refused to heed the commands of the police officer, who followed them as far as Divide, and who shot into the air once in an effort to compel them to halt.

Word was telephoned ahead to Oakland, where Deputy Sheriffs E. E. and Burdette LeLas and G. C. Cooper placed them under arrest. They were found to be armed with automatic revolvers, which were seized by the officers. They claim that the car in which they were travelling is the property of Frank Rose, a Seattle restaurant keeper. Officers are checking up on the ownership of the car and are also endeavoring to determine whether or not the men are wanted elsewhere.

MAN ACCUSED OF TRANSPORTING LOCAL WOMAN SKIPS BAIL

The United States treasury was enriched by \$2000 yesterday when on motion of Assistant United States Attorney Byron, bail provided for Clarence E. Ater by two professional bondsmen, John Rometsch and Alfred A. Closset, was declared forfeit. Ater was indicted under the Mann Act for taking Maude Bridges from Roseburg, Ore., to Champaign, Ill. When bond was provided and he was released, Ater fled the state.

Similar action was promised against J. D. Archer, convicted for transporting Ida Burgess from Walla Walla, Wash., to Portland. Upon conviction, Archer started an appeal action, then disappeared. Judge Bean gave his attorneys one week more in which to produce Archer.

FIGHT PROMOTER SOUGHT AS DOVERY MURDER SUSPECT

KELSO, Wash., Oct. 6.—R. G. Sharpe, assistant attorney-general assigned to investigate the murder of Thomas Dovere, Kelso editor, late yesterday issued a warrant for the arrest of John William Smith, charging first degree murder.
Luke S. May, criminologist, who has been working on the case in connection with Cowlitz county authorities, issued a statement urging co-operation of the press and officials in apprehending Smith. He said Smith was in Kelso a few days prior to the killing of Dovere. He was one of the promoters of a prize fight for which the city council refused to grant a permit, due to protests by Rev. W. W. Switzer and members of the citizens welfare league, of which organization Dovere was secretary.
May said Smith hired an automobile in Kelso, June 20, the day after the murder, and abandoned the car in Portland. May said the motive in the murder connecting Smith with the case was robbery, but that other motives were considered. W. L. Thompson, alias William Reese, arrested in Oregon Saturday, is still held on an open charge in connection with the Dovere case.
John W. Smith, said to have been associated with Hart in boxing ventures, was accused of murder in connection with the same case in a warrant issued late yesterday by Governor Hartley to investigate the case, Sheriff Clark Studebaker, said today that he learned that Smith was seen in The Dalles, Ore., three weeks ago today.
