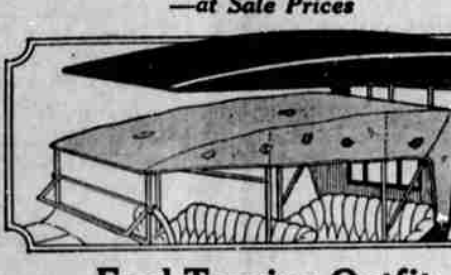

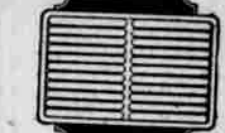

EPISCOPAL BUDGET 18 MILLION; SHOWS MISSION DEFICIT

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 9.—The program for the next three years

in the Protestant Episcopal church calls for a budget of \$18,000,000, of which \$13,500,000 is for the maintenance of existing work. Lewis H. Franklin, vice-president and treasurer of the National Council, today submitted the program to the general conven-

tion of the church, now in session here. Receipts for the budget in the last three years have been more than \$1,000,000 a year below the new figure, Mr. Franklin said, but rather than reducing the budget the council recommended the removal of several items that would make for a reduction of \$1,200,000.
