PEACE GUARANTY SATISFACTORY TO GERMANY REACHED

(Associated Press Local Wire.) LOCARNO, Switzerland, Oct. 12.—Agreement was practically reached today on the conditions of Germany's entrance into the League of Nations and the delegates to the security conference, now hopefully predict the success of the conference.

The allies have perfected a solution of the German league membership situation which Chancellor Luther and Foreign Minister Stresemann hope will satisfy German public opinion and at the same time safeguard the friendly relationship of the rift with Russia.

One big issue remains unsettled—France's guarantee for Poland—and this was discussed privately and with progress today by M. Briand, Dr. Stresemann and Count Skrzynsky, the French, German and Polish foreign ministers, prior to the plenary session of the conference.

A communique issued after today's session, said: "Clarifications and decisions requested by the German delegation in the conference upon the question of the league brought about a general exchange of views and explanations. This exchange resulted in progress of the work of the conference toward the adoption of a satisfactory solution."

Today's session was the most exciting since the inauguration of the conference for Chancellor Luther and Foreign Minister Stresemann, insisted on more than the allies were willing to accord on the league issue. They were told flatly by all that it was a case of accepting what was prepared, or adjournment of the conference.

The German leaders held a whispered consultation and then announced their adherence to the allies' ideas.

The conference adjourned until tomorrow. Meanwhile the league text will be whipped into final shape.

When Christmas comes around, this year, that popular gift, the handkerchief, will not be given as a handkerchief, as of yore. For, the newest thing is to fashion the gift-handkerchief into a doll of some sort, thereby amusing the receiver as well as pleasing him with so useful a present. I have taken note of some of the cleverest handkerchief dolls in the city shops and herewith describe them to help those of my readers who may wish to employ the idea:

Clothesline Quaker Doll: Draw eyes, nose and mouth on the head of a wood clothespin, then paste a poke bonnet of gray grosgrain ribbon onto the back of the wood head. Cover the remainder of the clothespin with more of the gray ribbon (not supplying legs, as the stiff ribbon skirt enables the little doll

to stand alone). To conceal the fact that doll has no arms, and also to form a white, old-fashioned "kerchief," wrap a plain linen handkerchief (folded into a triangle) around the doll's "shoulders" and bring it around over the "chest," crossing at the waist. Secure this gift-handkerchief in place with a black-headed pin, so that it may easily be removed from the doll.

Ballet Dancer Dolls: This doll provides a means of presenting a fancier handkerchief than the Quaker described above. Dress a small celluloid Kewpie doll in colored net, place a tinsel bandeau around her waist so that it appears to be one of her trailing skirts.

The Half-doll Doll: If you wish to give a little girl six handkerchiefs, do not present them uninterestingly in a box! Dress a small china doll with them, using your own imagination to make this dress. I recently saw one with the handkerchiefs used as follows: One formed the waist; two made the sleeves; another two were used as a petticoat and a dress skirt; and the sixth handkerchief was shaped into a fetching picture hat.

Gypsy Doll: This is a pretty way to present three vivid handkerchiefs of different colors (yellow, red and purple, for instance). Buy a small inexpensive doll with dark hair, pinning the ends at the back of the neck. Use the yellow one as a cape (pinned at waist in front), the purple one as the skirt. Make a series of chains of colored "bunch" beads to hang about doll's neck. Several bracelets will help to carry out the Roma effect—and perhaps earrings!

BISHOP BROWN IS DEPOSED BECAUSE ADJUDGED HERETIC

Next Chapter in Fight in Episcopal Church Will Be Registered in Federal Court.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 12.—The Right Rev. William Montgomery Brown of Galton, Ohio, former bishop of Arkansas, was "deposed from the Sacred Ministry" at the triennial convention of the Episcopal church here today.

Bishop Brown did not answer when his name was called in his absence and sentence was pronounced by the Right Rev. Ethelbert Talbot, presiding bishop.

Many bishops were in the congregation, but there were many empty seats in the church auditorium.

After an opening prayer by the presiding bishop the chaplain called Bishop Brown's name three times, but without response.

Bishop Talbot then announced that Bishop Brown had been convicted of "holding and teaching publicly and advisedly certain doctrines contrary to those held by the Protestant Episcopal church," and recalled that Bishop Brown had been tried by a trial court and a court of review and his sentence of deposition upheld by a two-thirds vote of the House of Bishops and concluded:

"I depose William Montgomery Brown from the sacred ministry; and do declare that he is so deposed."

Notice has been served on the presiding bishop and, through him, on the House of Bishops, to appear in United States Court Wednesday morning to show cause for the proceedings against Bishop Brown. It was said that counsel will appear for the president and the House of Bishops.

SKULLS OF EXTINCT BEASTS UNEARTHED BY ANDREWS PARTY

(Associated Press Local Wire.) PEKING, Oct. 10.—The fossilized skull of a two-horned beast that probably walked the earth on cloven hoofs some millions of years ago in the age of mammals is the latest discovery made by the third Asiatic expedition.

Roy Chapman Andrews, leader of the expedition and known through out the world as the discoverer of dinosaur eggs in Mongolia, and Walter Granger, chief paleontologist of the expedition, returned here from the Mongolian wilds on September 19th.

The skull in question, after the traces of the "dune-dwellers," previously described by Mr. Andrews, was regarded as the most important find of the season. The horns are peculiar in that they are larger at the top than at the juncture with the skull, suggesting that the animal might have belonged to the giraffe family.

Two other skulls were found larger and suggestive of the Rhinoceros, but with teeth like nothing heretofore known in paleontology. The skulls are being shipped embedded in the rock in which they were found for treatment in the museum of natural history in New York.

An important feature of the finds, according to Mr. Granger, is the fact that they suggest a new group of pre-historic animals in Asia.

"Nine-tenths of the fossils we find in Asia are common to America," he said. "The group known as Chalicotheres, hoofed animals with claws, is European and American, and the Titanotheres group reaches its maximum in America, measuring up to four feet in height. Now here in Asia we find an abundance of specimens."

WILL SEEK DESIGNATION OF NATIONAL GOOD ROADS WEEK

RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 12.—Observance of "Good Roads Week" throughout the United States in conjunction with the annual convention of the American Road Builders' Association at Chicago, next January 11-15, is the aim at Charles M. Upham, state highway engineer, and manager for the road convention. Governor McLean has been requested to so designate the week in North Carolina and governors of the other states and President Coolidge will be asked to issue similar proclamations.

TO OBSERVE BIRTH OF OMNIBUS

LONDON, Oct. 12.—Plans to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of the birth of the omnibus in Europe have been launched here but whether the celebration will be held in London or Paris has not yet been decided. It was in 1825 that the first omnibus lumbered through the streets of Nantes, France, although it was not until four years later that a similar vehicle appeared in England. Today there are 38,000 omnibuses, most of them double deckers, operating daily in London.
