### LOCAL MERCHANTS ARE VICTIMIZED BY CHECK ARTIST

Robert Locheal, for whom officers are seeking a check artist, worked several local merchants on the same system which enabled him to procure \$20 worth of groceries and \$40 in cash. Locheal, who resided in the Ten Mile and Olalla vicinities for about two years, is now a fugitive from justice, a warrant for his arrest being in the hands of the sheriff. In addition to his alleged operations at Ten Mile, he is charged with having passed worthless checks on S. B. Crouch, Bubar Brothers and Wilson's Tire Shop.

In each case he worked the same game. He inspected a purchase, stating that he was expecting a check and that he would return as soon as he procured the money. Shortly afterwards he appeared with the check, which the unsuspecting merchant cashed, usually giving money in addition to the article purchased.

At Crouch's store Locheal is said to have procured a rifle and suitcase, and at the Tire Shop he purchased a tire for his car, getting cash change as well.

At Bubar's he inspected a diamond engagement ring and also a watch, the purchases coming to about \$100. His father, he is said to have told the proprietors, would provide him with the money to buy the articles, and he went out, returning shortly with a check and the information that his father was delighted that he was buying an engagement ring for the girl.

It is expected that other checks have been passed which have not been reported. In his purchases from Roseburg merchants Locheal is said to have used the name of Darrell.

### TWO ARRESTED FOR DISTURBING OLALLA DANCE

Robert A. Healy and Clarence Hull were arrested Saturday night for disturbing the Olalla dance, and a warrant is out for the arrest of E. R. Gardiner, who will also be accused of disturbing the dance and possibly of resisting an officer. Healy entered a plea of guilty to a charge of being drunk and disorderly when arraigned before Justice of the Peace George Jones and was fined \$10. Hull pled guilty to disorderly conduct and was fined \$5. Gardiner is alleged to have been the ringleader in the disturbance and when the officer went to arrest him struck the deputy sheriff with a flask or bottle of liquor in throwing it away. He then ran into the brush, according to Deputy Sheriff Fred Byron. The officer went back to the dance hall, expecting to catch Gardiner when he returned to drive his car away, but the woman in the car released the brakes and let the car roll out of sight, where Gardiner apparently reached it and drove away.

### FORMER ROSEBURG WOMAN DIES IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 12.—Mrs. Frank P. Hogan, 73, who was an infant member of the party which in 1852 came west via the isthmus of Panama under the leadership of General Joseph Lane, is dead here. She was a granddaughter of General Lane, who was the first territorial governor of Oregon.

Mrs. Frank P. Hogan was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Flood, who came to Oregon with Mrs. Flood's father, General Joseph Lane. The party which they accompanied left Indiana in 1852, traveling by way of the isthmus, and reached Oregon in 1853. Mrs. Flood was a merchant in Roseburg until his death some years ago. After her marriage Mrs. Hogan went to Spokane with her husband and later moved to San Gabriel, California. Her husband was at one time sheriff of Douglas county for several years.

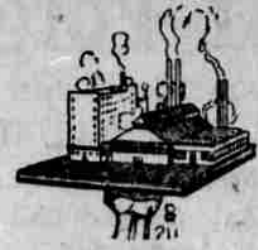
