## NEXT BOXING CARD TO BE HELD LAST WEEK THIS MONTH

The next boxing card in Roseburg will be held the last week in this month, probably on the 25th or 29th, according to the announcement made today by Promoter Charles H. Clough. Originally it was Mr. Clough's intention to pull off the next bill about one month after the first one, which was held on the 6th of this month, but such a large number of local fans have displayed so much eagerness for another fisty program that Mr. Clough decided on an earlier date.

Another thing that also caused Promoter Clough to change his mind was the fact that Mitchell, the local middleweight scrapper, is to change his residence to another city before November 1, and the fans wanted to see him in another battle before he left. Mitchell's opponent in his farewell bout will be Henry Brown, the former Sutherland boy, who issued a challenge to Mitchell at the first card. Brown is now employed in Roseburg and is training faithfully for the fight, which ought to be a hummer. Brown's style of milling is on the same slugging order as Mitchell's. He is a glutton for punishment and can give as well as take. The men are carded for a semi-final event of six rounds, but the wisecracks among the local sports predict that the battle will be too fierce to last more than two or three rounds.

Principals for the main event have not yet been secured, but Promoter Clough has plenty of applications from which to make selections. He is taking his time about it, because he wants to be sure of getting the very best men for the money. He expects to be able to announce the headliners by the first of next week.

## FAMOUS TEMPLE OF APOLLO BUILT BY GREEKS 600 B. C.

### Italian Archeologists Dig Up Works of Art 3000 Years Old in Ruins of Ancient City.

ROME, Oct. 14.—Discoveries of primary importance to archeology are announced by the Italian scholars who have been excavating on the site of the ancient Greek colonial city of Cyrene, on the North African coast, between the modern cities of Benghazi and Derna. The excavators say they have proved that the famous temple of Apollo, the main temple of Cyrene, when it was among the fairest of Mediterranean cities in the sixth and fifth centuries, was originally built by the Greeks about 600 B. C.

The temple was taken from a stratum of earth alongside the ruins of the temple's sub-structure, in which the excavators found works of art dating as far back as 1,000 B. C., and believed to be of Libyan origin. Many of these art pieces are said to be priceless.

Cyrene was one of the first and most prosperous colonies founded around the Mediterranean in the era of Greek colonial expansion. Its beginning is placed at about 650 B. C., and its founder, according to legend, was Battus, who placed the dates of the Delphic oracle. At its zenith Cyrene is believed to have had 100,000 inhabitants and its temples were among the finest in the ancient world. The local Arabs now call the place Gremna, a corruption of Cyrene, and say that it takes six "camel hours" to go from one end to the other of its ruins.

## LOAD LIMIT IS PLACED ON ROAD TO COOS BAY

The state highway commission has issued an order reducing the maximum load limits allowed on 14 more improved state highways, the action being taken for protection of the roads. The highways affected by the order are: Alsea highway, Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, Coos Bay-Roseburg highway, Corvallis-Newport highway, Crater Lake highway, Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway, Seaside-Tillamook highway, Mt. Hood Loop, Prineville-Lakeview highway, Redwood highway, Roosevelt coast highway, The Dalles-California highway, Willamette highway between Goshen and Lowell and Willamette Valley-Florence highway between Chehalis and Rainrock.

## SEASON WILL OPEN SOON ON CHINA PHEASANTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—The open season for hunting Chinese pheasants in all parts of Oregon opens Thursday and continues until October 31. Not only may Chinese pheasants be killed during the period between October 15 and October 31, but sooty or blue grouse, ruffed grouse or native pheasants may also be killed. The bag limit is four of any such birds in one day, or eight during any consecutive seven days; provided that not more than two female Chinese pheasants may be killed in any seven consecutive days.

## PACIFIC HIGHWAY TO GET PUBLICITY IN NEW BOOKLET

"The entire Pacific highway from Canada to Mexico is to receive extensive publicity for the purpose of increasing tourist travel over it," said Capt. Harry L. Wells, editor of Pacific Coast Travel, a new magazine devoted to the promotion of travel up and down the coast by the Pacific highway. Capt. Wells was a former editorial writer on the Portland Oregonian and went to the Philippines in 1923 in command of one of the companies of the Oregon regiment. He is on his way north to Vancouver and Victoria, gathering data for an illustrated folder booklet descriptive of the whole route of the Pacific highway from these cities to the Juanes Mountains.

"Roseburg is so situated," said Capt. Wells, "that every bit of the new travel we create must pass through this city. On other parts of the line there are alternate routes, but only one through this beautiful Umpqua region. That means that Roseburg will get the full benefit of all the new travel."
