known, Donald Hunt was a true, spirited athlete. A clean sportsman throughout. He participated in the various athletic endeavors of the Roseburg high school with credit to himself and to his school. He was a star player in every sport, fighting for the school to the point of exhaustion, always willing to forget individual honors in his efforts to bring victory to his school. Just as he had entered college and was standing on the threshold of a brilliant career he was accidentally killed by the discharge of a gun which he was cleaning.

Horner Field is proposed in recognition of the services of Dr. J. B. Horner, now dean in history at the Oregon Agricultural college. Mr. Horner claims the distinction of having established the public school system in Roseburg. He was one of the earliest principals in the Roseburg schools and was one of the pioneers in the educational field in this vicinity.

The school board has hesitated to choose a name for the new field. There are so many persons deserving of honor, so many names which would prove suitable, that the school board has passed the responsibility on. It was thought best that the older students of the school, the alumni and those who have gone through the school's experiences, should be given the right to choose the name, and consequently this policy has been adopted.

All former students and graduates have the privilege of expressing their choice of names. Any preference should be made known to City Superintendent M. S. Hamm before Saturday of this week, as the balloting will be closed at that time, and the name having the highest number of votes selected.
