NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—The anthracite coal situation in New York state has reached a point virtually parallel to that during the most acute period of the coal situation in the winter of 1922-23, the state coal commission announced today, after a conference of representatives of all sections of the state.

ARTISTS TO POR. TRAY RUSSIAN LIFE

MOSCOW, Oct. 15.—(A. P.)—Soviet educational authorities have decided to send to various places in the Soviet Union 72 artists to paint pictures of local revolutionary events, portraits of local leaders, scenes of labor processes and other social features of present day life. The expedition will include a number of noted artists. They will visit the Crimea, the Urals, the Ukraine and the northern provinces. A number of artists are to be sent abroad for the same purpose.

COMMISSION URGES AUSTRALIA TO CONTINUE SEARCH FOR OIL

MELBOURNE, Oct. 16.—While the prospects of the discovery of oil in commercial quantities in Australia are generally unfavorable, indications in the Roma district of Queensland and the Kimberley district of western Australia justify the recommendation that further detailed geological mapping should be undertaken and trial borings conducted, says a report of the federal joint committee of public accounts on oil exploration in Australia and Papua.

MAY WITHDRAW PUPILS FROM SCHOOLS TEACHING IRISH

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.—The Technical Committee of County Mayo has reduced from 670 to 490 pounds the money provided for the teaching of the Irish language, and forecasts a further reduction next year.

Monsieur D'Alton who introduced the motion said that he knows mothers who threaten to withdraw their children from school if the teaching of Irish is not dropped. He declared that the spoken language is losing ground, even in districts where it was generally spoken till comparatively recently.

The government recognizes this, but thinks it regrettable, and is taking steps in all directions to remedy it. Irish is now made a compulsory subject in the primary schools all over the country, and the government has appointed a Commission which is taking evidence as to the condition of the language in the Irish speaking districts, and the reason for its decay. The chief reason is economic.
