## Farm Reminders.

Potatoes jabbed with forks or that are cut are not No. 1 potatoes. Special care should be taken to avoid mechanical injury, says the O. A. C. experiment station, in order to get a higher percentage of marketable potatoes. Very smutty seed wheat should not be planted, reports the O. A. C. station. Reasonably clean seed what may be given the copper carbonate treatment and smut will be effectively controlled. The formaldehyde treatment is the best treatment known for winter coat and barley. Full directions for treating may be had from the county agent or the college.

## MISTAKEN FOR DEER WITH USUAL RESULT

## Today's Markets

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 17.—Unusual strength was shown in the local egg market during the past week in both fresh and storage stocks. The market has gradually worked upward closing today at 54 cents on fresh extras, a new top for this season. A week ago extras closed at 51c, showing an actual gain on the top grades of three cents for the week.

Firats closed today at 49 cents, an advance of 2 cents over night and a gain of 4 cents over a week ago. Pullets lost a cent in the closing session of the exchange, but still show a gain of three cents over a week ago. Current receipts closed at 52 cents, a gain of 2 cents since last Saturday.

Strength in the local market is contributed to the export of storage stocks to England as well as the general upward trend in outside markets. Fresh arrivals have been only moderate this week and buyers are advertising in the country for additional supplies.

Butter quotations were unchanged on the local dairy board for the day, but the market is firm. Cubes averaged 1 to 1 1/2 cents higher than a week ago on the exchange.

Country dressed meats have displayed a sluggish tone along the street during the past week, closing easier on both hogs and veal. Buyers were not very keen at any time and only bargains or extra fancy animals would interest them. Choice light veal closed at 14 cents and choice light hogs at 18 cents.

An easier tone in live poultry was also shown during the week. Receipts were sufficient for all requirements and the demand was only nominal and hardly noticeable at times.
