BLIZZARD SWEEPS MICHIGAN; SEARCH ON FOR TWO BOYS ISHPEMING, Mich., Oct. 21.—Searching parties are scouring the woods today for two boys lost during the blizzard which swept this section Sunday. Also Johnson, 17 years old, and his nephew, Waino Maki, 14, whose homes are in Ionia, were caught in the storm two miles from their homes, when they sought to reach home before it struck.
