PHILIPPINE SOLDIERS BUY OWN UNIFORMS LOOK NEAT

MANILA, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—By purchasing their own uniforms rather than wear "the cheap shoddy clothing issued here," Major General Eli A. Helmick, inspector general of the United States army, said the enlisted men of this department made a good appearance during his inspection.

General Helmick described the shoddy issue as an oversupply of World War times, which he said

were unfit for any use except as work, fatigue or field clothing. "It illustrates the fine spirit of the enlisted personnel, both native and American, that they have willingly gone into their pockets and paid for the material and making of good uniforms," said the general. "I hope that they will no longer have to do this and I shall do everything in my power to remove this hardship."

General Helmick commended the Philippine soldiers of the Philippine Scouts. In the general's opinion, the Philippine soldier easily submits to discipline and when properly trained and led would always acquire himself well in the field.

HEAT WITH GAS MARION COUNTY CLOVER SEED CROP TOTALS 250,000 LBS.

SALEM, Oct. 22.—The clover seed crop in the immediate vicinity of Salem this year will run from 250,000 to 300,000 pounds, of approximately twice as large as the 150,000 pound crop of last year, according to estimates made by Chas. E. Archer, who handles large quantities of the local seed, and it is expected the price will average about the same as last year, although the quality is reported to be much finer than last year.

The average price by the time the season is over will run about 25 cents, according to Archer's estimate. The top price so far paid for this season's seed has been 23 cents, with the average up to now about 27 cents.

The French crop is reported to be very large this year, and it is stated that seed from the French crop can be laid down in Salem for 23 cents.

Eastern seed is being sold in the eastern market for about five cents a pound less than here.

The seed from this locality is all being marketed on the coast and the entire local crop will be absorbed on the coast. It is expected that the crop this year, while nearly twice as large as last year, is only about one-third of a normal crop, according to Archer's estimate. The dry weather of last year prevented germination of the crop sowed at that time, considerable clover was frozen out last year, and this season also was dry, holding back the crop.

The clover went in streaks this year, some farmers getting as high as six bushels to the acre, and some as low as a peck. This difference being noticed sometimes in adjoining ranches.

PICTURES RADIO AS FUTURE NEWS MEDIUM OF WORLD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—Radio has a future in which entire newspapers will be flashed as complete issues. International broadcasting will be commonplace, entertainment and instruction will be chained a captive.

This is the vision of Major-General James G. Harbord, president of the Radio Corporation of America, in an address prepared for delivery today before the conference on education and industry at the University of Chicago by the university and American Institute of meat packers.

But in the near future, he thinks, there must be an international radio conference, "to settle grave issues that cannot be much longer delayed."

"America has taken the lead in radio communication with a total of 60,000 miles with trans-oceanic circuits to many parts of the world," he said. "There are more than 600 radio casting stations in the United States and the radio business has grown from a total of approximately two million dollars in 1920 to \$250,000,000 in 1924 and to an estimated total of a half billion dollars in 1925."

The problems of the industry and of its future fall into three classes: Technical, commercial and those touching public and governmental relations, he said.

TEST EINSTEIN THEORY ON "PUP" AND IT PROVED GOOD

PASADENA, Oct. 21.—(A. P.)—The Einstein theory has been tried on the "pup," and it has made good.

With the aid of the Dog Star Sirius and its celestial but invisible "pup," Dr. Walter S. Adams, director of the Mount Wilson observatory, said that one of the bases of Einstein's proposition, which says that light has mass and is subject to gravitational attraction, has been further substantiated.

Sirius' companion is said to have a density so great that a pint bucket of its substance would weigh 25 tons on this earth. With such density goes exceptional gravitational pull, say the scientists, and Dr. Adams' experiments established the fact that the sun's rays in traveling past this star were bent by this heavy drag.

The conclusion reached was that light is not illuminated nothingness, but that it has mass and, that being the case, it is prone to be attracted or repelled by certain forces, notably that of gravitation.

ARLINGTON, Or., Oct. 22.—(Special)—Mrs. A. B. Snodgrass, aged 68, one of the pioneer residents of Arlington and a native of Oregon, died at the Snodgrass home here Sunday night. Mrs. Snodgrass, who was formerly Miss Angeline Nowland, was born in Roseburg, Ore., May 2, 1855. She was married to A. B. Snodgrass at Cornelius, Ore., May 19, 1872. They moved to Arlington in 1891 where they have since resided, being one of the best families of the town and community.

Three children were born, only one of whom is now living. Mrs. Snodgrass is survived by A. B. Snodgrass, her husband, 82 years of age, who crossed the plains in 1822; one daughter, Mrs. Hattie Bell Templeton of Rock Creek, Ore.; one sister, Mrs. Sarah Emerick of Arlington, and two grandchildren, Claud and Clyde Wristen of this city, who own and operate the Arlington Dray company. Funeral services will be held tomorrow from the home at 1 o'clock.
