**COMMISSIONER MEAD COMPLAINS OF WATER USERS NOT PAYING UP.**  
(Associated Press Local Wire.)  
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—A Washington special dispatch to the Morning Oregonian says in part: "More than 100 water users of the Klamath Irrigation project in Oregon and California are largely in arrears in their payment to the government, including four delinquents who own or control 1279 acres of irrigable land on which the unpaid tax on October 5, amounted to \$28,884." Elwood B. Mead, reclamation commissioner, charged today after an investigation of conditions on the project. Dr. Mead described the general financial showing of the project as most commendable, due to the fact that a large proportion of the water users have paid a tax in excess of that due the government. He implied a criticism of the officials of the irrigation district, however, for failing to collect from "particularly flagrant delinquents." The serious charge that he had instructed the sheriff at Klamath Falls, who is also the tax collector, to eliminate from the tax roll all unpaid district taxes for the years 1920-24, inclusive, against the lands of the president of the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district.

### 54 PERISH WHEN BRIDGE BREAKS AT RELIGIOUS FETE

LONDON, Oct. 23.—Details of the disaster at Tanta, Egypt, during a great religious ceremony, in which fifty-four persons are reported to have been killed and many injured, are being awaited with much interest.

The reports thus far received vary. One is to the effect that panic seized upon the great crowd while the mounted police were endeavoring to make a passage for the minister of pious foundations. Another says that the railing of a bridge broke and that hundreds of persons were thrown into the water. Fifty were drowned and large numbers were trampled to death. Still another report, which also refers to the breaking of the bridge parapet, says that fifty-four persons were drowned and hundreds injured.

The occasion for the great gathering was the feast in honor of Seyid-El-Bedawi, a muslim saint of great renown, whose aid is invoked when strength is needed to resist a sudden calamity.

### GEORGE HOLTSCLAW AND BROTHER CAUSE TROUBLE

On Monday night about 9:30 o'clock, George Holtsclaw and his brother, Earl, were arrested by City Marshal Elmer Hayes in a running battle up the alley behind the postoffice, says the Glendale News. In an attempt to get George, who was drunk, to quiet down and go home, Mr. Hayes was met by a volley of vile epithets and foul names. Mr. Hayes ran to the city hall where the council was in conference and called for assistance, but before they could get here, Holtsclaw and his brother were again up the alley, throwing stones and making malicious threats.

At the head of the alley on Second street, George, assisted by Earl, grappled with Mr. Hayes and struck him over the head with a blunt instrument. They were parried and started for the jail, all the while Mr. Hayes was being called foul names by Holtsclaw. Just before reaching the jail, Earl Holtsclaw, who was not guarded, turned and started up the alley with the threat that he would "go home and get Dad and a gun." He was stopped, however and made to follow along.

George was lodged in jail for the night. Charges of drunk and disorderly were filed against him on Tuesday morning, to which he pleaded guilty and was assessed a fine of \$100 and costs. No charges have been placed against Earl as yet.
