DEFENSE GOES LIMIT TO PROVE INSANITY IDEA

(Continued from page 1.)

Dairyville Contradicted.
Frank Falten, Dale Arthur and C. N. Willis, convicts at the prison, who said they witnessed the escape from a window of the cell house, were called by the defense. Their story of the break was practically the same as that told by other witnesses, except they said that the first shots were fired by the guards and not by the escaping convicts.

Falten and Arthur contradicted the testimony of Warden Dairyville, who said that after running to his house for a gun he got behind some oil barrels near the garage and fired three shots at the fleeing convicts just after they came over the wall at tower one. Both said that they saw the warden come out of his house with the gun, but declared that at that time the three fugitives were half way across the field between the asylum and the prison, out of gunshot range and that the warden did not fire.

C. M. Charlton, former principal keeper at the prison, testified that he had placed Willis in the bullpen at the latter's own request.

Kelley Truthful Crook.
Practically the entire morning was spent by the defense in developing its theory of temporary insanity brought on by injuries suffered in their earlier life by the defendants and by the use of merrawauna while in the prison. Several character witnesses for Kelley, including his father and mother, were also placed on the stand.

Willis was placed back on the stand this morning, long enough to tell of having been knocked unconscious three or four years ago when he fell from a horse. E. H. Lister, of Eugene, traffic officer for the state highway department and a former deputy sheriff in Josephine county, was the strongest witness for the defense today. He testified that he had known Kelley for 10 or 12 years in and around Grant Pass. Kelley, he said, was always truthful and admitted all of the crimes he was ever accused of.

Dr. L. F. Griffith, alienist of the

state hospital for the insane, stated this afternoon that Kelley and Willis were perfectly sane.

DISSATISFACTION WITH 'MA' WARMS UP TEXAS G. O. P.

DALLAS, Tex., Oct. 22.—Rumblings of dissatisfaction in the democratic ranks in the state have given Texas republicans new life and that party for so many years, dormant in state politics, plans to stage a hot campaign to elect a governor in 1926.

The republican state executive committee here yesterday decided to hold an informal convention next spring to recommend candidates for the first state-wide republican primary in Texas.

No secret was made by leaders of their intention to capitalize the present unrest in state politics over charges of irregularities in the state highway department under the administration of the state's first woman chief executive, Governor Miriam A. Ferguson.

The victory will be effected, it was intimated, with the aid of democrats who are expected to rebuke present and past "conditions" by forsaking party lines and vote for "the man," and the adherents plan to enter a gubernatorial candidate, who will draw votes from both parties.

FOOTBALL FIELD IS SOAKED TO LAY DUST BEFORE GAME

With the city donating the use of the new street flusher, while the California-Oregon Power company supplied the water, the new high school athletic field in West Roseburg was thoroughly soaked today, preparatory to the football game tomorrow between Roseburg and Eugene high schools. The field has been getting dry and dusty the dust being so heavy that it was difficult to follow the plays. The dry hard field also increased the danger of injury to the players. The soaking down of the field today will put it in excellent condition. The dust will be laid without making the field soggy and at the same time it will be softened enough to eliminate the danger of serious injuries.

HOHENZOLLERN LIBRARY OF 100,000 VOLUMES HELD.

BERLIN, Oct. 23.—The family library of the Hohenzollerns, comprising about 100,000 volumes, besides numerous maps, musical publications and sketches, forms part of the Hohenzollern inventory claimed by the German Republic as being the property of the state.

Pending the ultimate decision of the courts the library remains in the former Royal Castle at Berlin. The library was founded September 20, 1852, when the private library of Frederick the Great, King Frederick William II, III and IV, and the small but valuable personal library of Queen Louise of Prussia, were incorporated. Prior to that date these various libraries were kept at different castles.

The originator of the idea of founding a library of the Hohenzollerns was Duvigne, the librarian of Frederick William IV, who suggested the plan to the king in 1859. His suggestion, however, did not meet with the approval of the Treasury of the Royal Household and it was not until 1882 that his successor, Dr. Dohme, overcame this opposition.

By 1871 the new library contained 10,000 volumes. At the suggestion of Emperor William I, a number of contributions from the library were made to other libraries.

From 1880 to 1888 the Hohenzollern library was steadily enlarged, rearranged and recatalogued and with the ascension of Emperor William II, and the new librarian, Walter Robert Tornow, it was given an entirely new lease. By an Imperial edict in 1895 a large number of smaller family libraries scattered among the various castles were also incorporated.

Although the Hohenzollern Family Library was intended for the exclusive use of the Hohenzollerns and their court retainers, it was accessible to all intellectual persons who had an interest in studying the books.

of the animals would be allowed. "They're my horses and I certainly will not allow anything to be done that will injure them," Howitt said. "I know that horses can't be run on pavement without ruining them. Except in Portland very little of the course will be on pavement. The riders will follow gravel along the sides of the pavement, and, where it is necessary, will use side roads. Specially constructed rubber shoes will be used for the last lap in Portland."

Howitt pointed out that since there was no real competition in the race, it would be more of an exhibition of methods used by the old pony express riders than a speed trial.

NEW TYPE PASSENGER LOCOMOTIVES SEEN HERE FOR FIRST TIME TODAY.

The first of the new passenger type locomotives, recently ordered by the Southern Pacific company, went through this city today attached to train number 14. The locomotive is much larger than those formerly in use, is of the Pacific type with high drive wheels and is capable of giving much more speed and power than the engines formerly in use. It will cut down the number of helpers needed in passenger service materially. The engine will be operated through from Gerber, California, to Portland. The engine passing through Roseburg today was the first to be delivered of the fifteen which have been ordered. It weighs about 246,000 pounds on the drivers.

SOUTH WANTS GOVERNMENT TO YIELD INHERITANCE TAX

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Abandonment by the federal government to the states of revenue from state inheritance taxes was asked by half a dozen governors of southern states today before the house ways and means committee.

Imposition of the levy was described as an invasion of state rights and a diversion into the federal treasury of money needed by the states. General approval was given to suggestions that the federal government continue the tax if full credit is given to states which impose similar levies as a means of securing uniformity.

Declarations by the committee members that the wealthy could escape the tax by moving to Florida, which has no inheritance tax, led to proposals for retention of the federal tax as a check.

Secretary Mellon has asked repeal of the federal tax.
