### MUSIC TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION MEETING TODAY

The regular monthly luncheon and business meeting of the Roseburg Music Teacher's association was held this noon at the home of Mrs. Fred Strang, with a good attendance.

Following luncheon, prepared and served by a committee of members, the business meeting was opened, and a number of important items taken up. G. V. Cook, corresponding secretary of the organization, and chairman of the benefit dance held October 16 at the armory, for the Douglas County Concert band, made a report on the tickets left unsold and expenditures and outstanding bills contracted from the dance. There was a discussion of the tax to be paid the Internal Revenue office for the holding of the dance and the president instructed Mr. Cook to write to the United States Internal Revenue office in Portland for blanks to fill out for the payment of the tax.

About \$120 was taken in at the dance and it is thought following the payment of outstanding bills, there will be a good sum to turn over to the band. There was some discussion as to adopting a plan in assisting the band financially, but the association thought it best to wait until the first election before a definite decision was made.

The important event before the association next spring is the state convention, to be held here two days in May. The date is yet not decided. At the time it was decided to hold the convention here, C. S. Heinline interviewed the heads of the various booster organizations, asking their cooperation in putting on the convention. Mrs. Fred Strang, president of the association, suggested that the head of each booster organization be asked to attend the next luncheon and business meeting, to be held at the home of Mrs. A. J. Young, November 30. At this time they will be made acquainted with facts concerning the convention, and the association will enlist their aid in making the convention a successful one.

Mr. George Wilbur Reed, of Portland, previously had sent to the local music organization for an itemized statement of the expenses each delegate would have during the convention here, and Walter Germain was appointed a committee of one to get the information desired and send it to Mr. Reed. The members of the association will probably provide rooms for the visiting delegates in private homes for the two days and will ask the help of different organizations in Roseburg in entertaining the delegates.
