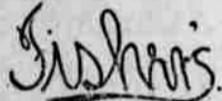

NAVY DAY OBSERVED TODAY

Navy day and the birthday of Theodore Roosevelt were observed today by the Roseburg Kiwanis club. An appropriate program, prepared by E. A. Britton, presented to the club. Sergeant Carlson, of the U. S. marines, gave a short talk outlining the activities of the marines and the founding of the land and sea force. His talk was fine and greatly appreciated by the Kiwanians. Kenneth Clark, Virginia Doyle, Raymond Bell and Evelyn Houser, local high school students, gave fine talks in which they outlined the history of the U. S. navy from the early times. These students were well informed on their subjects and were congratulated on their talks.

Lincoln Antles, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, had the principal address in which he paid a high tribute to the memory of that great statesman, Theodore Roosevelt.

A number of visitors were entertained at today's meeting and several peppy songs were sung which added to the success of the occasion.

PARAZOO HELD FOR AIDING TWO BOY FUGITIVES

Charles Parazoo, a resident of the Peel vicinity, was arrested last night charged with harboring fugitives from justice, and aiding them in efforts to evade the law. His arrest followed the search of officers for Howard Newman and Ira Dumore, who are charged with the robbery of the old Sluder cabin above Peel.

The case grows out of the arrest of William Welch, a runaway boy from Washington county, who was taken into custody yesterday. Sheriff J. E. Reeves of Washington county passed through Roseburg a few days ago on his way to Klamath Falls, and while here asked Sheriff Starmer to arrest the Welch boy, who was reported to be with the Dumore and Newman boys at Peel. Deputy Sheriff Leas made the arrest, and brought Welch to Roseburg. Shortly after the boy was brought to the city, word came of the robbery of the Sluder home. Welch was given a heavy grilling and finally admitted that together with Newman and Dumore, they had robbed the house and told the officers that the loot was hidden at Parazoo's home.

The officers immediately returned to Peel, but in the meantime the stolen goods had been taken back to the Sluder home, and the boys were not in sight. Parazoo was arrested for aiding the youngsters.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 27.—Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, made a fighting entry into Mexico City last night. Not that he personally participated, but nevertheless his arrival was evidenced by numerous fist fights in the throng of admirers who gathered at the station to greet him.

The champion has come to Mexico for a series of exhibition bouts with his sparring partners. He will make his appearance in the ring next Saturday.

READY FOR GONG OF BOXING CARD TO BE HELD FRIDAY

Everything is in readiness for the boxing card to be held on Friday of this week. Cal Herman, Salt Lake boxer, is expected to be in Roseburg tonight and Evans, who is to be his opponent in the ten-round final is due on Thursday. Brown and Mitchell, who are to fight the six-round semi final, are working out daily and both are in excellent condition. Mitchell has fully recovered from the injury to his ankle, sustained a few days ago, and is showing up well in practice work. Local boys will make up the two preliminaries to be held before the semi-final. "Wildcat" Morris, who gave the crowd a good exhibition at the last card, will be one of the preliminary participants.

MISSING GIRL IS RESCUED FROM JAPANESE HOUSE

SEATTLE, Oct. 27.—A 16-year-old girl who disappeared from her home in Port Angeles 19 days ago was rescued here yesterday by detectives from a house operated by a half-caste Japanese woman in Seattle's underworld, frequented by negroes. The woman and three men, one a negro, were arrested. The girl is held for safekeeping and as a witness.

The raid on the house came as an aftermath to a sermon of Rev. Dr. Ambrose M. Bailey of the First Baptist church before 2,000 churchgoers Sunday night in which he declared bootlegging, gambling and the worst vices flourished in Seattle.

The girl was taken to the place, it was said, through circumstances hinted by Dr. Bailey when he declared that if the public knew the facts, "there would be a race riot, or the lid of the town blown off."

The girl said she left Port Angeles with Chester Foote, one of the men arrested, "for the fun of the adventure."
