known in the records of Western criminal procedure. In the minds of the twelve jurors who debated Weston's fate for 72 hours there must have existed grave elements of doubt, as evidenced by the verdict of second degree murder.

"I have been governor for almost three years. This is the fourth full pardon I have issued. In every case, I became convinced of the innocence of those incarcerated and acted accordingly. During my term as governor, pardons cannot be bought by money, by political prestige, by powerful influences nor by friendship, but they will be granted freely to every unfortunate one when I am convinced that there has been a miscarriage of justice."

### MARK BROOM NOT GUILTY LOCATING STILL, JURY SAYS

Last Minute Evidence for Him Given by Fugitive Who Sacrifices His Own Freedom.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—Mark Broom, tried by a circuit court jury on a charge of seizing a still, was found not guilty in a verdict returned late yesterday afternoon.

Testimony against Broom was all circumstantial and Broom's defense was the testimony that he was at a rooming house in Albany at the time the deputies made a raid on the upper McKenzie and located a still.

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 30.—"We have another witness we want to introduce before we rest our case, but he is not here—oh, here he is now," exclaimed attorney for Mark Broom, alleged moonshiner, during Broom's trial in circuit court here. The district attorney and a deputy or so gasped. The witness was L. Kenna T. Pickert, the man shot by deputies in a raid upon a still near the state fish hatchery on the McKenzie river, March 31, and who was afterward sentenced to jail, but ran away when working on a trusty gang at the county fair grounds.

After Pickert had testified for Broom, deputies stationed themselves at the door of the court room and placed him under arrest. He had been sought since his escape but this was the first trace officers had obtained of him.

Pickert was serving out a \$1,000 fine and a six months sentence, when he fled.
