## MARKETS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—Short, snappy advances in the local potato market during the past week have been rapid and valuable. Irregular both on the country and city that Portland dealers and jobbers are all up in the air. No one seems to know just what the actual market is on potatoes, and consequently there is a wide range of buying and selling prices today.  
There is more or less a panicky feeling on the potato market. Growers naturally are very bullish and in most instances in no mood to sell. Look for extreme high prices and are holding.  
On the other hand dealers are very skeptical of the sudden advance and do not care to take on supplies at the higher prices. They openly admit that the advance was too sudden and too large to create a healthy condition.  
Today buying prices on the country are all the way from \$1.90 to \$2.25 with some extra large Burbanks held at \$2.50. In the city wholesale dealers are quoting \$3 on Burbanks with some U. S. No. 1 fancy stock at \$2.25. Yakima stock ranges all the way from \$3 to \$3.50 per hundred.  
Firm undertone is showing in Northwest hop markets. Recent sales in this territory made at 24 cents. While the statistical position of the market is none too strong, local buyers are again in the field trying to pick up supplies. Eastern market on coast hops ranges from 27 to 30 cents.

to be presented for discussion, and also data on the economic production of the crop. The standardization, quality and size of the product will be investigated by John G. Bacon, a prominent grower of the Umpqua section.

The question of taking small Italian prunes in sizes under 60 off the market, as prunes was brought up, and the investigation along this line, and as to what use can be made of such prunes, will be carried on by T. D. Rutenbark with the assistance of the Horticultural Products Department of the College.

It is hoped that a comprehensive program will be the outcome of the findings of the committee, as the production and marketing of prunes in Douglas County has long been a problem of vast importance to all growers interested in this phase of horticultural project being conducted in the county.

## CANADA ELECTION IS FAVORABLE TO TARIFF ADVOCATES

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 30.—Indications today were that no party had received a working majority in the House of Commons by yesterday's general election, but the liberals who now control the reins of government were overthrown.

Incomplete returns indicated that Arthur Meighen and his followers of the conservative party had defeated both the members of Premier W. Mackenzie King's cabinet and also had made great inroads into the seats of the liberals and progressives throughout the dominion. Premier King, who had urged a moderate tariff, himself went down to defeat in his own constituency. Several of his ministers also were beaten.

dictates. You can take some simple candy, the value of which you can judge by the sugar, one ounce of sugar containing 115 calories. Or you can have part of an ordinary slice of pie which is 300 to 600 C., depending upon its richness; or some ice cream (the same number of calories), but advise you not to take these because it is best to learn not to care for them.

Now I want to talk a little bit about the distribution of your calories. You can take them during the day in any manner which you find most convenient. Take them all in one meal if you like and drink nothing but water the rest of the day, or take them in two meals, or take them in five meals. I have had thousands of letters from the followers of our articles on reducing, and many of them say that they find they get along best on a late breakfast of about 400 C., and a dinner at night of the balance of the 1200 C.

Personally, I like best to have 100 C. for breakfast, 350 for lunch, 100 at tea time, and 650 for dinner in the evening. If, however, I am invited to a lunch, I take my 100 C. for breakfast, which consists of a cup or two of coffee with 100 C. of cream (1 and 1-2 tablespoons heavy cream to 100 C. of coffee) or a cup of clear coffee, with 100 C. of coffee cake—and then I have 600 or 800 for lunch, and the balance of my calories (usually of fruit) for my evening meal.

A very satisfactory lunch is a glass of milk (100 C.), a slice of whole wheat bread, one-half inch thick, or a shredded wheat biscuit (100 C.) and a big apple (100 C.). This totals 350 C. A pint of milk alone (220 C.) also makes a very satisfactory lunch. Another one is a large salad—one-half pound of any greens (250 C.) with one-half tablespoonful of mayonnaise (50 C.)—2 heaping tablespoonfuls of cottage cheese (100 C.) and a slice of whole wheat bread (100 C.). If you make your mayonnaise dressing of mineral oil you won't have to count any C's.

If it is not convenient for you to get these things you can nearly always get fruit for lunch. At tea time if you are not hungry, you can save your 100 C. for dinner. Sometimes a big glass or two of water will satisfy the hunger contractions. (Hunger is supposed to be caused by the contractions of the empty stomach.) Sometimes a tiny bit of lemon or orange peel or a clove will have

## EUGENE SEEKS TO CLOSE DANGEROUS ENTRANCE TO CITY

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 30.—The public service commission today set Tuesday, November 3, as the date of a hearing at Eugene on petition of the city of Eugene for the closing of the grade crossing over the tracks of the Southern Pacific at Blair boulevard at the northwest entrance into the city.  
The Southern Pacific company has waived statutory time in which to answer the petition, indicating that the company will not strongly oppose the move.

The petition states that the city has already begun the improvement of Railroad avenue, which parallels Blair boulevard to the east, and which it is claimed, will furnish a more direct route into the city.
