INSTRUCTOR OF VIOLIN TO SPEND WINTER IN CITY

Donald Parker, who returned yesterday to Roseburg after a five-year absence, announced today that he is preparing to open a studio for instruction in violin music and is now enrolling pupils. Mr. Parker is a violinist of unusual ability and has been quite prominent in musical circles in Portland.

He has studied violin with pupils of Ysaye, Hubay, Sevcik and Carl Flesch and has had a wide experience in concert work as well as in teaching.

At the age of 14 years he was playing with symphony orchestras in Montana. He has played in large symphony and theatre orchestras in Los Angeles and more recently in Portland. He was a member of the Portland Symphony and also of Gerskovitch Symphony orchestra of Portland. In addition to radio programs he has been in great demand in Portland for church, club and banquet programs.

He was in Roseburg as an instructor for several months about five years ago. He has business interests here which caused him to return to this city for the coming winter, and while here will again give violin lessons.

CONFLICTING TAX THEORIES POURING IN ON COMMITTEE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—General favor among members of the house ways and means committee for substantial reduction in both the income surtax and inheritance tax rates has now become indefinitely apparent from expressions given in the public hearing on new tax legislation.

The committee which will start work in drafting a tax reduction bill next Wednesday, heard endorsement for such reductions yesterday from Professor Adamas of Yale university, who advises with the treasury in the favor of the first income tax law.

Secretary Mellon has asked reduction of the maximum surtax rate from forty to twenty per cent and repeal of the inheritance levy. Many committee members, both republicans and democrats, have expressed favor toward cutting the surtax to 25 per cent and possibly to 20 per cent.

Argument of the treasury secretary that the inheritance tax should be repealed and left entirely to the states finds opposition in both ranks, however, chiefly because of the loop hole for evasion offered in the fact that Florida and Alabama have no such tax. At the same time, proposals for reduction of the present rates, with a maximum of forty per cent and for increasing the credit allowed for payments on state inheritance taxes have found distinct favor among committee members.

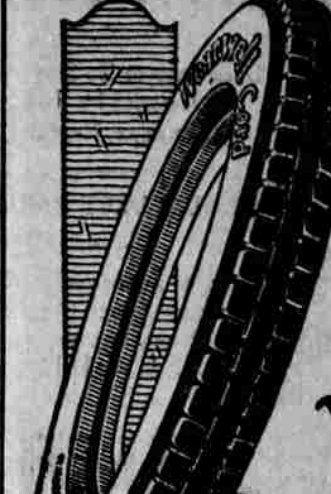
