DISPLACE RODEOS WITH PAGEANTS IS ASSOCIATION PLEA

Parent-Teacher Congress Is Also Opposed to Light Wines and Beer Propaganda.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 30.—Substitution of historical pageants for round-ups and rodeos was recommended by the Oregon congress of parents and teachers when in its concluding gist of resolutions, it adopted one disapproving the "wild western" type of entertainment.
"We do hereby express our disapproval of these performances, and we protest to those cities and towns in our state which sponsor them against any recurrence," said the resolution, which was introduced by the secretary, Mrs. Lillie B. Thomas.
"We further desire to express to their managers our belief that these occasions could be made much more interesting and attractive through the elaboration of pageantry features, which would give in wonderful colorful detail the picturesque development of the Oregon country from its earliest pioneer days."

Motion picture distributors were urged in another resolution to remove the block-booking system, on the ground that this system held up the showing of good films and forced upon the public many films otherwise unsalable and unfit for distribution.
The resolution also recommended reductions of "the prohibitive prices placed upon good films distributed singly."
The program of the national organization was honored, recommending conciliation upon a constructive legislative program. This includes:
1.—To put forward a program for peace.
2.—To aid in developing public sentiment to assist in enforcing the prohibition law and to protect against modification which will permit light wines and beer.
3.—To secure a federal department of education in the cabinet.
4.—To obtain federal aid to the states for the promotion of physical education.
5.—To reduce the sale of drugs and narcotics.
6.—To conduct an intensive educational campaign as to the real interpretation of the child labor amendment.
Other resolutions pledged assistance in the national program to wipe out illiteracy; co-operation in enacting needed revisions of the mothers' aid law; co-operation with the National Kindergarten Association to promote extension of kindergarten; endorsement of the Shepherd-Towner act; investigation of migratory labor conditions.
