PERSIA OVERTHROWS DYNASTY THAT HAS RULED 146 YEARS. (Associated Press Leased Wire.) TEHERAN, Persia, Oct. 31.—The Mejlis or national assembly today adopted a resolution deposing the Kajar dynasty which has ruled the country since 1779. The vote was 80 out of 85 in favor of deposition. The resolution says that ruling dynasty is deposed for the sake of the national welfare and that a temporary government in accordance with constitution and national laws, has been entrusted to the premier, Reza Khan. The resolution says it is left to the national assembly to decide on a permanent form of government.

LEGION OPPOSES PLAN TO NAME SCHOOL FOR HEAVYWEIGHT CHAMP (Associated Press Leased Wire.) DENVER, Colo., Oct. 31.—Proposals of members of the school board of Manassa, Colo., to name the new high school building there, "the Jack Dempsey school," has met with a storm of protest from the American Legion. John C. Vivian, past commander of the department of Colorado and present chairman of the district rehabilitation committee, said today that he had protested to the school board on behalf of the national organization. In his protest, Mr. Vivian declared that paying such a tribute to the heavyweight king would be "a direct affront—yes even an insult—to every W. W. veteran."

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—While the principals in the latest Stillman divorce proceedings continued in seclusion today, there came a report as to a definite reason for the institution of a suit by Mrs. Anne Urquhart Stillman against James A. Stillman. The New York American says Mrs. Stillman is suing so that she may be free to marry Fowler McCormick, 25 years old, who at her suggestion some time past put on overalls to learn the business of the International Harvester company from the ground up. The story adds that Mr. Stillman is prepared to permit his wife to obtain a divorce and that she will not demand large alimony, possibly none. GREAT LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY SHOW OPENS IN PORTLAND PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—The aristocracy of the domestic animal kingdom today opened court for the annual display at the eleven-acre pavilion of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition here. As usual the kiddies of Portland were honored guests at the opening day. Thousands flocked to the pavilion, to which they were admitted free. Pedigreed stock from all parts of the country where stock is raised were present. Trainloads of fancy beef and dairy cattle, horses, sheep, swine and other classes of "high-toned" quadrupeds have been arriving here during the past few weeks, and were groomed and combed to a high degree of attractiveness for the show. In addition to livestock the big pavilion houses a great display of poultry, more than 1800 entries being listed in the chicken division. The annual horsemanship opens with a performance tonight, and there will be events each night, and three matinees next week. High stepping horse flesh from the leading stables of the country is ready to compete in the various contests. A large industrial exhibit and other features are included in the exposition. There are 160 western horses entered for the horse shows events and 111 from other parts of the country including New York, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Kentucky and Missouri.
