With perfect appointments and distinguished by the dignity of a beautiful setting, the marriage of Miss Lois Miriam Geddes to Mr. Morris W. The bride formed a lovely picture as she descended the wedding stairs, preceded by her sister, Miss Faye Geddes, as bridesmaid, and followed by little Jean Geddes, best-maid, and advanced to the altar on the arm of her father, A. J. Geddes, who was unusually attractive in a bridal gown of white silk georgette, a creation which made a lovely frame for her superb beauty. The gown, sleeveless, was a silhouette model with flare skirt. Pearls, always a suitable accessory, were heavily used over the entire gown, which departed from the usual with a V-line neck in back, heavily embroidered in pearls in lattice form.
