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DEADLOCK APPEARS LIKELY IN CANADA HOUSE COMMONS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 31.—With the results in only six constituencies in doubt, Canada's general elections have brought about the nearest approach to a preliminary deadlock in the history of the dominion.

The conservatives under Right Honorable Arthur Meighen have made large gains, but with only 116 seats thus far assured they clearly cannot command a majority in the next house of commons. In these circumstances, it seems certain that Premier MacKenzie King will not resign before the meeting of parliament. The premier, however, has yet to consider the situation with his colleagues, and he will also confer with the governor-general before making any public pronouncement.

In circles close to the ministry, it is understood that Mr. King favors challenging a vote of non-confidence. If he is supported in parliament, he will continue in office for the time being at least, but if the house votes against him, his resignation will necessarily follow.

Mr. Meighen, as leader of the opposition, would then, in accordance with custom, be called upon to form an administration. But it is not likely that he would continue in office long in such a case without another appeal to the country.

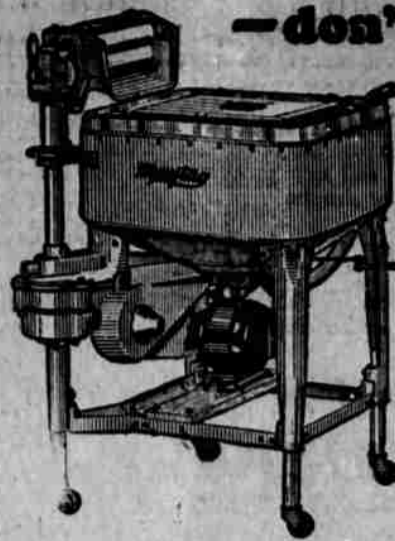
The general feeling in political circles is that Canada's fifteenth parliament will be short-lived. The situation will be one of constant uncertainties with the possibility of a surprise vote at any moment turning out whatever government happened to be in power.

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 31.—Standing of the parties in the House of Commons on the base of the returns from the Canadian general elections, up to nine o'clock this morning was: Conservatives 116 seats; liberals 99; progressives 21; labor 2; independent 1; doubtful six. Total 245.

Doubtful seats are: one in Queens, Prince Edward Island, where the vote is tied; Kenora-Rainy River in Ontario, where Peter Heenan, liberal, is leading Colonel Machin, conservative, by 150, with 30 districts yet to report; Bow River and Peace River, Alberta, and Kindersley and Maple Creek, in Saskatchewan.

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GRANTS PASS AND MEDFORD BOOSTING FOR ROAD TO CAVES

MEDFORD, Ore., Oct. 31.—At a hearing in Jacksonville yesterday afternoon, before members of the state highway commission regarding the creation of a super road district from Williams to the Oregon Caves, over a dozen witnesses were called, all of them favoring the new road, with the exception of Attorney H. D. Norton of Grants Pass, who, while not definitely opposing the proposition, questioned the wisdom of creating the district at the present time.

Delegates from Ruch, Williams, Provolt and Medford, declared the new highway would benefit all sections of Southern Oregon. W. H. Gore, former state representative, and E. C. Gaddis, former Medford mayor, leading in the discussion. An interesting feature of the meeting, attended by about 300 residents, from all parts of Jackson and Joseph counties, was the appearance of C. E. Davidson of Williams Creek, who discovered the Oregon Caves in 1874.

Mr. Davidson, a typical pioneer, was loath to speak, but finally yielded to persuasion and said that he favored the new road for he calculated the more people who saw the caves, the better for all concerned. The people in his part of the country he said, are tired of having to "hop along a cow trail" to get a sight of these caverns.

The highway commission announced they would consider the testimony and make their decision in the near future.

CHURCHES CHALLENGED TO UNDER-TAKE CRUSADE

renewed moral crusade to strengthen the hands of those who are responsible for prohibition enforcement and in particular to give a greater measure of moral support to the newly reorganized activities of the Federal Government. It urges upon all citizens who believe in prohibition the necessity of supporting the law by an irrefragable volume of public opinion. Of those who may be out of sympathy with prohibition as a social measure or who question the wisdom of the particular method by which it was adopted, it asks voluntary compliance with the law in the interest of orderly government and in order that the policy it represents may be adequately tried. It appeals for a new measure of fair-mindedness and good will on the part of all in connection with this vitally important issue in order that the outcome of the great moral effort may be determined by reason rather than by prejudice and self-interest.

Especially does the Federal Council urge upon the churches the necessity for a more adequate program of education on the moral issues involved in the liquor traffic. We strongly emphasize the need for a far greater attention to this problem in the church's program of religious education. In the last analysis, law depends for its support upon the public opinion which sustains it and the conscience of those who live under it. There can be no greater mistake than to suppose that legislation can relieve us of the necessity of training our youth in habits of temperate living, self-control and the practice of Christian citizenship. To foster such habits and to cultivate such practice is the special and peculiar responsibility of the Church, to be ignored only at the peril of the nation.

"It is our hope and confidence that the report of the Research Department on the prohibition situation, calling attention as it does to the real dangers with which we are confronted, will stir the churches to a renewed sense of their responsibility, not only for the enforcement of the nation to its support."

SEYMOUR JONES TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR
