INDIANS HOLD MEETING TODAY WITH SENATOR
(Continued from page 1.)
The official claim as made to the Indian commissioner is as follows: To the Honorable Commissioner, of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C.
We members of the following tribes of Indians, Alsea, Siletz, Tillamook, Coquille, Kwtami, Toontonee, Rogue River, Coos Bay, Umpqua, Skotom, Shuslaw, Shasta, Calapuya, Cow Creek, Tututis, Lakemint, Mary's River, Chocoma, Molalla, Yamhill, Chinook, Clackamas and other bands or tribes of Indians not residing on the Siletz or Grand Round Indian Reservations, but residing at other places west of the Cascade mountains, in the state of Oregon, represent and claim compensation of the government of the United States for the following reasons:
First: The Indians were the owners of approximately 5,000,000 acres of land lying west of the

Coast Range and between the Pacific ocean and the Oregon and California state lines, the title to which has never been transferred to the United States government by treaty or otherwise. The Indian tribes entered into a treaty with the government on August 11-17-1845, but this treaty was never ratified. That these Indians were forced to abandon their homes, they were moved about the state and the government proceeded to occupy the lands as if the aforesaid treaty was in full effect. That these lands were valuable in respect to the timber, mines, fisheries and other resources in this territory. That the Indians lost these lands and the government did not compensate them for it. That the Indians are entitled to just compensation. That the said property was and is worth the sum of \$2.50 per acre and that the aforesaid tribes are entitled to compensation for the same from the United States government.
Second: That the treaty entered into the 10th day of September, 1852 by and between the representative of the United States and the Rogue River Indians has never been complied with by the United States government, in this: That the consideration mentioned in Article Three of the aforesaid treaty has never been fully paid by the United States government and that these claimants demand an auditing of said accounts and payment of any balance found due them thereby. That the government of the United States removed the claimants mentioned in said treaty from the territory described in Article Two, which was done hastily because of hostilities between other tribes and white settlers coming into the Indian country and under promise that they would be permitted to return later, which was not done, thereby compelling claimants to abandon their crops, stock, canoes and other personal property of the value of approximately forty thousand dollars, (\$40,000.00) and that the said claimants have never been reimbursed therefor and are entitled to said sum from the United States government. That at the time this treaty was made the commissioner representing the government promised the Indians that if they would sign the treaty the government would build a good white house for each head of the family and issue horses, cattle, money and other things necessary for their support when they were removed from their homes to a reservation in the Willamette valley that was to be selected later, which promises have not been fulfilled and the claimants are entitled to compensation for the same.

taxes will benefit all the people of all sections," he said, "by bringing and keeping capital in industry, the most pronounced benefits will come to the south and the west, the sections having the greatest accumulations of capital.
"The effect of high surtax rates is now reflected in the slow recovery in the livestock and other basic industries, in lack of capital at reasonable rates in many lines of investment and enterprise."
Urging reductions in the inheritance levy, Mr. Mondell proposed that new rates be retroactive to the date of enactment of the 1924 revenue act, which increased the duties.
"There is a widespread and earnest opinion in the country," he said, "that the increase of the estate (inheritance) taxes in 1924, in the absence of any national emergency, was a mistake, that it was neither logical nor reasonable and that the wrong then done should be rectified."

BRIDGE OF GODS TO BECOME A REALITY IN FORM OF STEEL
(Associated Press Local Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—The fabled "Bridge of the Gods" across the Columbia river, just below the Cascade Locks, is to be reconstructed in modern steel. Legends of the red men say that once a stone archway spanned the river at this point.
Contracts for construction of the bridge have just been signed and work will begin at once. The structure will be ready for use by next July. It is announced.
About three years ago work was begun on the new "Bridge of the Gods", but was abandoned.
Walla Walla, Wash., and Portland financiers are back of the company which is building the bridge, which will cost \$600,000. The bridge will be 1,350 feet long, exclusive of approaches. It will be of the Cantilever type with the middle span 705 feet, longest in the Northwest.
