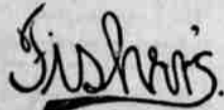

place will be visited. The workers are not going to demand any specified amount, but will leave it up to the business or professional man himself, what he will give. It should be borne in mind, however, that this is a ten-in-one proposition. That where \$5 may be a suitable donation for an organization conducting its own campaign, that a community chest gift in like proportion would be \$50.

Employees of business houses will be solicited at their work, wherever possible. Upon payment of his pledge he will be given a card to hang in the window of his home or to be presented should soliciting committees call at his home, in order that there may be no duplication.

In order to simplify the work of the committee, and in order to prevent the time of employees being taken from their work employers can, where they prefer to do so, solicit their own employees. In such cases they will be provided with pledge certificates. The minimum pledge from employees is expected to be equivalent to at least one day's wage. In Marshfield the employees averaged 2 1/2 day's wages in their gifts to the chest.

As soon as the business district has been covered, the teams will be assigned sections of the residential districts and will proceed to canvass the entire city. Persons who have already pledged, will have their certificates to show to solicitors or can hang them in a window, so that there will be no second request.

A list of contributors will be published at frequent intervals, so those pledging to the community chest can see that their pledges are correctly reported. In the event of any error they are asked to immediately notify the committee.

Headquarters will be established at the First State and Savings Bank building, which has been donated for the purpose by Mr. Booth.

Attorney B. L. Eddy is chairman of the Community Chest committee. J. H. Booth is campaign chairman and Dr. E. B. Stewart is vice-chairman.

"The community chest is an orderly, business-like method of meeting the charitable and welfare requirements of a community. Let's support it," was the final plea made today by Mr. Booth.

A huge thermometer is being prepared and will be erected tomorrow in front of headquarters and will graphically display daily the increase in the community chest fund.
