DEAF SCHOOL HEAD GOES TO IOWA FOR TWICE THE SALARY

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5.—O. L. McIntyre, who has been superintendent of the state school for the deaf since October, 1922, today presented his resignation to the state board of control, and it was accepted, to be effective November 27. Mr. McIntyre resigns to accept the superintendency of the Iowa school for the deaf at Council Bluffs, where he will receive a salary of \$4,000 a year, just twice what he receives in Oregon. Also he has received indications that there may be an increase in the salary in Iowa in the near future.

McIntyre came here from Oklahama to succeed E. S. Tillaghast, former superintendent of the Oregon school.

The state board has not yet decided on a successor to Mr. McIntyre and no applications have been received. The resignation was expected some months ago, but after the school year opened it was believed he would remain here.
