## ERNIE WOODARD AND BILL POOLE KAYED AT SALEM

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5.—After  
sending Ernie Woodard of Portland  
to the mat seven times, several  
of them for the count of nine, Frankie  
Lewis, Indian scrapper of Salem,  
put the Portland boy out in the  
fourth round of a scheduled 10-  
round go here last night. The pong  
saved Woodard in the third. Danny  
Garth of Silverton knocked out  
Bill Poole of Monroe with a terrific  
uppercut in the first round.

Lewis, conquerer of Woodard,  
has written to Promoter C. H.  
Clight of Roseburg, requesting a  
fight with Cal Herman in this  
city, and there is a probability of  
the lads being matched for the  
main event of the card to be pulled  
off here on the 20th of this month.

Lewis and Hermann fought a rattling  
good draw in Salem several  
weeks ago, and it was shortly af-  
terwards that Hermann knocked  
out Woodard in this city in four  
rounds.

Garth, who disposed of Bill Poole  
in such quick fashion, may be Bert  
Tribbey's opponent if the latter,  
well known middleweight of  
Marshfield, is billed on a local  
card. Garth has been under con-  
sideration by Promoter Clough, but  
some doubt has existed as to  
whether he was good enough to  
give Tribbey a real battle. In  
knocking out Poole so easily, Garth  
seems to have qualified for a try  
at the Marshfield man as Poole  
was considered a tough customer  
to beat.

**TAX ON FORGETFULNESS  
LATEST OF FRENCH  
FINANCE FASHIONS**

PARIS, Nov. 5.—A tax on forget-  
fulness is the most up-to-date thing  
in French revenue novelties.

The gentleman who leaves stock  
certificates in his taxicab and ma-  
dame who forgets everything from  
her cigarette case to her pocket-  
book will now pay rather heavily  
when they claim their belongings  
at the Lost Property Office in the  
police headquarters.

Money and securities will be re-  
turned to their owners at a charge  
of 4 per cent of their value. Jew-  
elry, "except anything having no  
intrinsic value," is redeemable on  
the same terms. The "no intrinsic  
value" clause is expected to kill  
a ver y promising publicity field in  
the matter of lost jewelry. For  
every other article, new or nearly  
new, two francs will be charged;  
for everything else, one franc.

## ACTOR TOO ARID TO PAY ALIMONY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)  
MINEOLA, N. Y., Nov. 5.—Mrs.  
Edda Davenport Tinney's divorce  
suit against her husband, Frank  
Tinney, comedian, was heard today  
by Supreme Court Justice Riegel-  
man. Decision was reserved.

George A. Hopkins, counsel for  
Tinney, in opposing Mrs. Tinney's  
application for alimony of \$750 a  
week, said the comedian, who is  
now in London, had been without  
a job for three months because of  
his drinking. This made it impos-  
sible for him to pay such alimony,  
the lawyer said. He told the court  
that Tinney formerly made \$2,500  
a week appearing in London music  
halls and night clubs.

Hopkins made no answer to the  
statutory charges on which Mrs.  
Tinney based her divorce suit. In-  
gone Wilson, chorus girl, was  
named a co-respondent.

## EDITOR TO STAY IN JAIL 1,000 DAYS

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Oct. 5.—  
Holding that liberty of the press  
as guaranteed by the constitution  
does not permit publications re-  
specting pending causes which are  
reasonably calculated to interfere  
with the due administration of  
justice, the third district court of  
appeal today denied the applica-  
tion of Alfred Lindsley, editor of  
the Humboldt News of Eureka, for a  
writ of habeas corpus. Lindsley  
is serving a sentence of 1,000 days  
in the Humboldt county jail for  
contempt of court.
