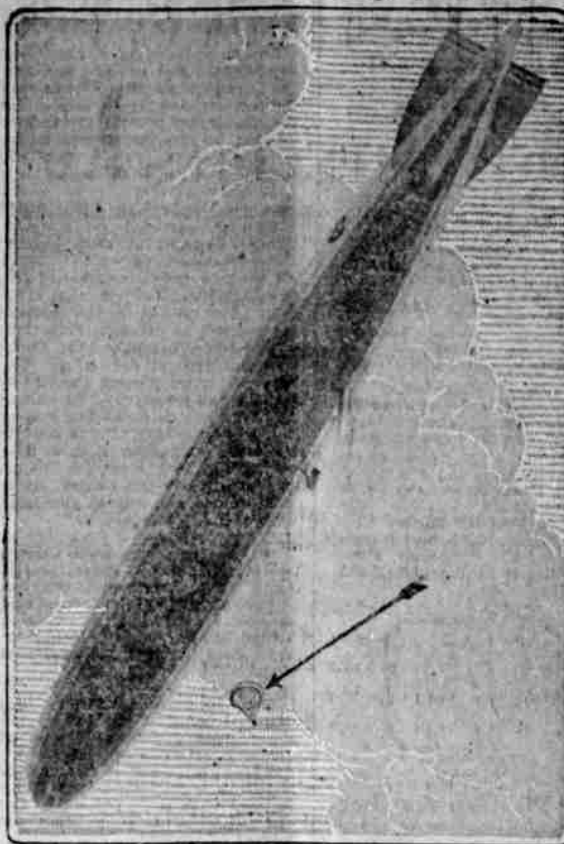
Boy Is Better—

LAKE CHELAN WILL BE HARNESSSED TO ELECTRIFY BIG G.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)
ST. PAUL, Nov. 6.—The Great Northern Railway today announced plans for a \$10,000,000 water-power development with production of 75,000 horsepower at Lake Chelan in north central Washington. Officials said the plan will result in early irrigation of about 80,000 acres of generally unproductive land and eventually will mean electrification of the Great Northern lines from the Cascade mountains and for more than 400 miles to France and Italy.

AUTO MAKERS OF ENGLAND ASK DUTY ON "CHEAP CARS"

LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Association of British Motor Manufacturers has applied to the Board of Trade to impose an important duty of 73-1-3 per cent on foreign commercial vehicles under the safeguarding of industries act. The association takes the ground that the motor industry in England is suffering from the dumping of cheap commercial cars from the United States, France and Italy.

SIX MEMBERS OF FAMILY DIE WHEN BUNGALOW BURNS

BALLSTON, SPA, N. Y., Nov. 6.—Six members of one family were burned to death by fire which destroyed a bungalow early today. The sole orphaned survivor is in a critical condition.

The dead are: George Kemp, 40; Mrs. George Kemp; Viola Allen, 14; Myrtle Allen, 9; Carol Allen 10, and Marcina Kemp, 11.

The Allens were related to Mrs. Kemp by a former marriage. Beatrice Kemp, 9, sole survivor of the family, escaped with her clothing in flames.

Beatrice summoned neighbors, but they and the firemen were helpless. The nearest hydrant was a quarter of a mile away.

When the flames died down the bodies were found huddled in one room of the one-story building. From the positions of the bodies, a doctor judged Camp had found a way of escape and had turned back to find the rest of his family, when flames closed their way out.
