MILL CREEK ROAD CONTRACT VOIDED BY COUNTY COURT

Following the questioning by County Commissioner Beckley, of the legality of the contract for the construction of a new section of the Mill Creek road, the county court has cancelled the agreement with the contractors, and all equipment and machinery has been withdrawn. The court allowed a contract in the sum of \$11,000 for winter work, but Commissioner Beckley questioned the legality of the action because of the failure to advertise the work. Because of this action the county court has decided to do nothing further on the project until next year, when more money will probably be available.

WILL ATTEMPT INCREASE USE HOME PRODUCT

Merchants Blame Lack Standard Pack and Advance Contracts

ADVICE IS GIVEN

Chamber of Commerce Secures Many Answers To Questionnaires—Great Interest

As a part of the work of preparing for the forthcoming agricultural economic conference the Chamber of Commerce is endeavoring to list all of the business of the county. This task is being assumed in order that a careful study may be made of the marketing possibilities of the county, which is one of the important features of the coming conference.

Each of the chambers of commerce in the smaller towns of the county is furnishing a list of the merchants and business houses in their respective communities. These will form the basis on which the committee will formulate its report. The merchants are being asked to help in the conference by giving suggestions regarding the marketing of home grown products. A questionnaire has been sent out to determine the amount of home grown and foreign produce handled and to learn under what conditions the use of home grown crops can be increased.

The replies from these questionnaires have been very satisfactory. Answers have been received from every part of the county, and for the greater part they are all calling attention to practically the same state of facts.

All merchants answering the communications indicate that they desire to use home products wherever possible.

Two chief reasons are given for not using home products exclusively. One is that growers do not give a standardized pack to the local merchant. If the growers took as great care in packing their produce for local consumption as for competition in shipment, there would be a much larger demand on the part of the merchants, many of the replies state. Growers will take great care in grading and packing fruits and vegetables for shipment, and will then give the local merchant the culls or poorly packed produce which has little sale value.

By shipping in foreign grown products he is assured of a standard pack and good quality.

Another important factor in the lack of advance contracting. Most merchants purchase their fruit and vegetable stock considerably in advance of the date upon which it is to be sold, or else deal with wholesale houses who keep a supply on hand for immediate delivery.

If the growers consulted the local merchants prior to harvest and contracted for the delivery at specified times of certain classes and grades of produce, the merchant would in many instances be glad to patronize the home farmer rather than the wholesale houses. However, he must know in advance what he is to have delivered to him, the quantities and the grades. If some such system is adopted the consumption of home grown products will materially increase, the merchants predict.

beer of much stronger alcoholic content than 4.4 would be permitted. Since prohibition exempts no class and was imposed by the people themselves it is neither tyrannical nor sumptuary. Prohibition is the ultimate method of dealing with the liquor traffic.

The Law's Martyrs

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—A challenge to American youth to enlist for service in defense of the constitution, with plenty of action and danger assured, was issued today by the Rev. M. P. Boynton of Chicago in a memorial service at the anti-saloon league convention for

the nearly fifty prohibition officers killed in action.

"We have now the full equivalent of war," Rev. Boynton said, "with greater hazards for the prohibition soldiers than the men at the front in the World war."

"These men who fell in the line of duty were upholding the flag and the constitution and had no barrage of fire clearing the way ahead for them. They went often singly and at night into dangers from moonshiners, bootleggers and rum runners just as desperate and vicious as the enemy in the World war. And their ranks suffered a far higher percentage of casualties than the American army in the World war. All of them are as surely patriotic martyrs for their country's honor and glory as those who sleep at Gettysburg and Flanders Fields.

GO-DEFENDANT IN STEPHENSON CASE OFFERS AN ALIBI

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., Nov. 6.—An alibi for Earl Klenck, co-defendant in the Stephenson murder trial, was offered by the defense today in the testimony of James Carter, deputy sheriff of Marion county (Indianapolis).

Klenck, D. C. Stephenson and Earl Gentry are charged with first degree murder in connection with the death of Madge Oberholzer of Indianapolis. Klenck is alleged to have aided in the girl's abduction to Hammond, Ind., and in taking her home after her return to Indianapolis from Hammond.

Carter testified that Klenck, then a Marion county deputy sheriff, was working with him on tasks of the sheriff's office during much of the time when Miss Oberholzer's alleged abduction was taking place. He re-
